Resolved, That the citizens of Montreal, in mass meeting assembled, emphatically protest against the adoption by the Imperial Parliament of the Coercion Bill for Ireland now before that body; that they denounce the proposed legislation as subversive of "the most cherished principles of the British Constitution," as a tyrannical suppression of the liberties of the Irish people, and a measure destructive of every hope of good feeling and unity between the peoples of the sister isles.

2. That we desire to express our sympathy with Gladstone, Parnell and their followers in their battle for liberty and civilization and to extend to them the assurance of our enthusiastic approval of their efforts in the past, and our earnest good wishes for their ultimate success in a struggle which, fierce though it be, cannot but result in their triumph.

3. That while we heartily appreciate the action of the democracy of Great Britain, that has done so much to cement in bonds of friendship the two races, we trust that this unjustifiable and exasperating measure of coercion may not have the effect of driving the people of Ireland beyond the limit of constitutional agitation, and that should their parliamentary leaders be unable to restrain any section of them, the people of England will hold the authors of this measure responsible for so lamentable a result.

4. That as citizens of Montreal we call upon our representatives in the Parliament of Canada, the Legislature of Quebec, and the City Council of Montreal, to give fitting expression to the indignant feeling of the people of the Dominion, the Province and the city against the proposed measure, and their unswerving sympathy with Ireland in her aspirations for Home Rule.



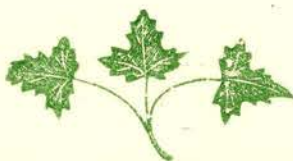

(ASSEMBLY BILL No. 114)

An Act for the purpose of authorizing the appointment of a royal commission to hold an investigation into certain matters relating to the administration of the municipal affairs of the city of Montreal.

(Sanctionné le 18 Mai 1887)
WHEREAS a petition signed by a large number of the rate payers of the city of Montreal has been presented to the council of the said city reciting the complaints made against the administration of its affairs by certain newspapers both against the council of the city and against the employees of the corporation; whereas the said petition concludes for the issue of a royal commission to inquire into the truth of such accusations, and that such petition has been transmitted to the government of this province;

Whereas another petition was also presented to the said council on behalf of the workmen's associations praying for a commission of inquiry to investigate into the working of the charter of the city and for the measures to be adopted to remedy the state of things complained of;

Whereas it is in the public interest that the prayer of such petitions should be granted; and an act to that effect be passed, as the existing laws appear to be insufficient to lawfully institute such inquiry;

Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

1. The Lieutenant Governor in council may issue, under the Great Seal of this Province, a royal commission, entrusted with making a complete investigation into the administration of the municipal affairs of the city of Montreal, upon the working of the charter of the said city and upon the conduct of the members of the council and of its officers and employees, from such time as he deems proper.

2. Such royal commission shall be composed of not more than three competent persons selected by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

3. The persons so appointed commissioners for the purposes of this act shall remain in office during pleasure.

4. Such commissioners shall as soon as possible after their appointment take and subscribe an oath before one

of the judges of the Superior Court to act impartially according to their conscience and to faithfully perform the duties of their office ;

The taking of such oath shall remain of record.

5. After having been sworn, the said commissioners shall select one of their number as president of the commission of inquiry and shall afterwards appoint a competent person to act as clerk of the commission ;

The said clerk shall be obliged to keep a register in which all the proceedings had before the said commission shall be entered by him.

6. The commissioners may, if they deem proper, appoint stenographers to take notes as complete as possible of the evidence given before the said commission ; the said stenographers being previously sworn in the manner provided in the Code of Civil Procedure ; the said notes taken shall be taken under the dictation of the president of the Commission.

7. The commissioners shall, as soon as possible after the organization of the commission, proceed, day by day as far as possible, to hold a complete and full inquiry into the administration of the council of the city of Montreal and of its officers and into the working of its charter, in accordance with the instructions which shall be given to them.

The said commissioners shall have all the rights and powers granted to commissioners appointed under the act of this Province, 32 Victoria, chapter 8, respecting inquiries concerning public matters.

8. The sessions of the commission shall be public, excepting during the time that the said commissioners shall deliberate upon any facts and questions which may be submitted to them or come to their knowledge.

9. The president of the commission shall sign the orders summoning witnesses and the other documents connected therewith, and shall have all the powers of the judges of the Superior Court to compel witnesses to appear, to give evidence and produce the necessary papers, and to punish them in case of disobedience.

10. The commissioners or the majority of them may, from time to time, as they deem proper, make partial reports of their operations addressed to the Lieutenant Governor in Council ;

When the inquiry shall be concluded they shall make a final report of their proceedings to the Lieutenant Gov-

ernor, which report shall be printed and transmitted to the municipal council of the city of Montreal.

11. The commissioners shall, as much as possible sit in the city of Montreal in the city hall of the said city, but may sit elsewhere if necessary for the purposes of the said inquiry.

12. The act respecting the independence of the members of this Legislature shall not apply to this act.

13. The fees of the commissioners, their travelling expenses and expenses, as well as the fees, salaries and emoluments of the clerks, stenographers, bailiffs and witnesses shall be paid by the city of Montreal, after being taxed and approved by the Attorney General.

14. To defray the expenses of the commission and insure its proper working, the Lieutenant-Governor in council may require from the city of Montreal, before issuing such commission, a deposit in money of a sum deemed necessary and sufficient for that purpose, which sum, if it become insufficient during the course of the inquiry, shall be increased upon notice to that effect to the said city by the president of the commission.

15. This act shall come into force by order in council upon demand made by resolution of the council of the city of Montreal ;

Such coming into force shall be rendered public by proclamation published in the Quebec Official Gazette and in four newspapers of Montreal, two in French and two in English, at least eight days before the commencement of the enquiry.

In conformity with a resolution of the City Council dated the 4th of July instant, I have examined all the papers and proceedings in connection with the disqualification of Alderman Rousseau, and I beg now respectfully to report:

That a judgment was rendered by Honorable Justice Loranger, on the 30th of June last, in a case wherein Napoléon Girard was Petitioner and Antoine Rousseau Defendant, declaring the election of the Defendant as alderman for the Hochelaga Ward illegal, null and void; this judgment was served upon the City Clerk on the 4th of July instant, and on the 2nd of the same month of July a deposit was made and an inscription of the case for review was filed according to law; the inscription was also served

served upon the City on the 4th of July inst.

The immediate effect of the inscription in review is to suspend the execution of the judgment, and to place the parties interested in the same position as if the Court had not yet pronounced a decision.

I am therefore of opinion that Alderman Rousseau is, until a decision be rendered in review, competent to sit in the Council as a member thereof.

As to the question whether the judgment rendered is susceptible of review, the point will be submitted to the Court for adjudication and, in the mean time, any opinion I might give would be of no practical utility.

It may be remembered that, in 1885, a similar question in the contestation of Roseval vs Tansey was submitted to the members of this Council, who then resolved to follow the same course as I now respectfully suggest, to wit: to await the adjudication of the Court upon the inscription in review of the aforesaid judgment.
