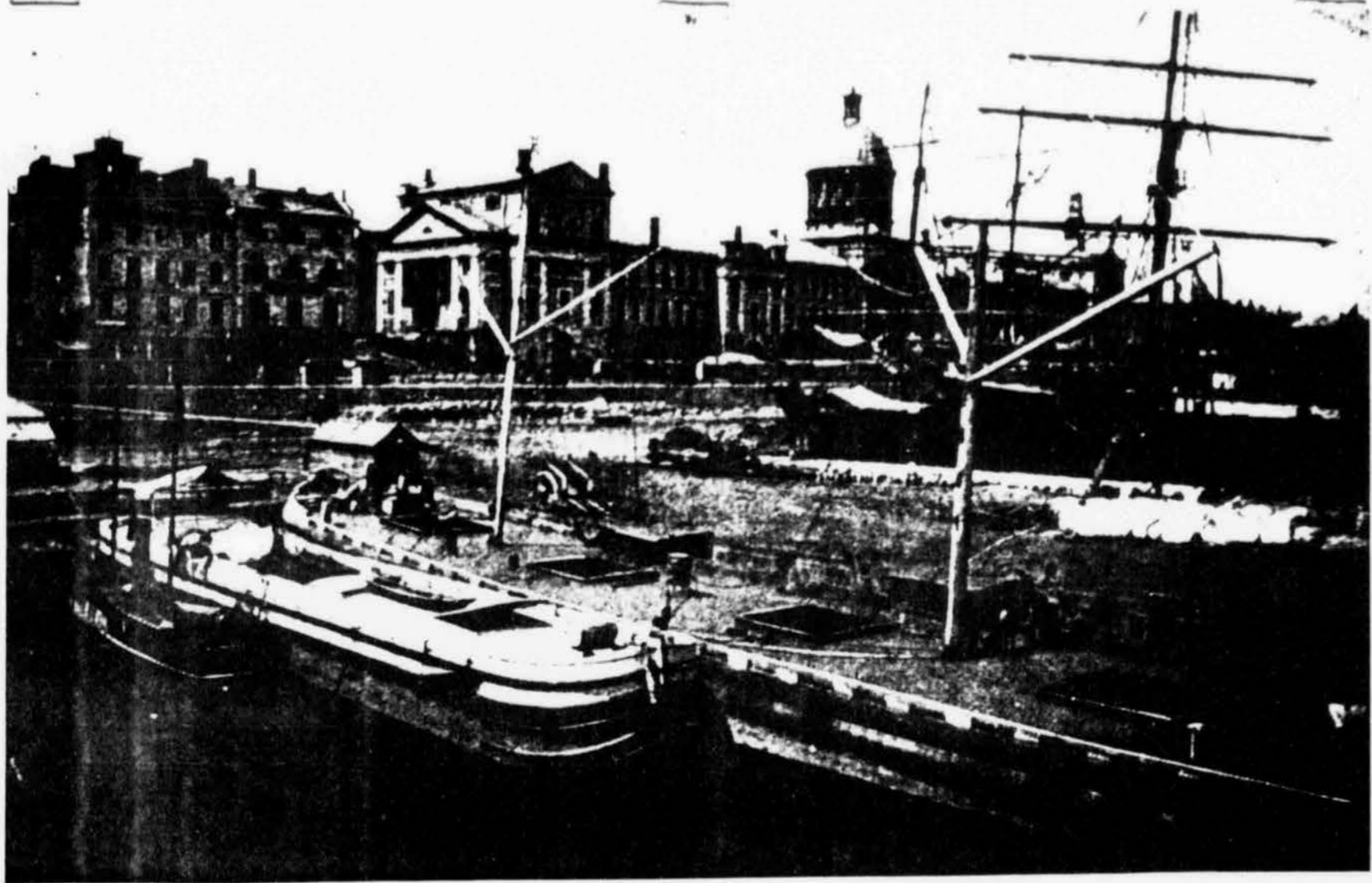

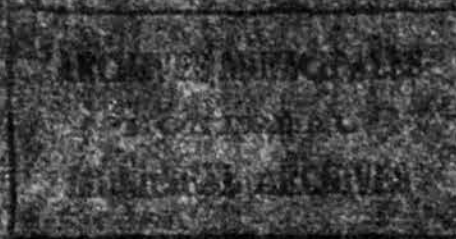

run-beam, ploughed & grooved to receive a three  
inch plank partition, The same planed.

& receive trimmer. Said trimmer to be  $8 \times 12$  with two extra posts to

The Story Posts to be 7 feet high by  
10 inch square, to be planed and chamfered,

To the Chairman and Members of  
the Markets Committee.

Gentlemen

Having being requested by your Committee to examine in company with Mr Hutchison, Architect, the Galvanized iron roof of the Bonsecours Market, the repair made to the wooden cornice and also the painting of the same.

I have the honor to report to your Committee as follow:

After having examined the roof with great care in its entire superficie, I find that the work as been done in a satisfactory manner and with great care. The metal sheets are well riveted and soldered together and sufficient nailed to the roof at top and bottom and also to the center of the bracks newly placed on the roof so as to allow for the expansion and contraction of the metal.

That the metal used is of the best Monro Wood 6<sup>th</sup> galvanized iron, and that nearly one third is of number 26 and the remainder of No<sup>s</sup> 24 and 25, giving an increase of strength and requiring a larger quantity of soldering.

The Iron Snow Gards are well made and properly fastened to the roof, and so arranged so as to prevent the water from penetrating through the roof -

The Gutters are made of the best No<sup>s</sup> 18, Galvanized iron well nailed to the roof, and properly soldered. The cross Joints

are riveted and soldered. The Holdfast of said Sutters are made of strong Iron placed 2' 3" apart.

The portion of the Galvanized Iron mesh to the stone walls is inserted into a groove made to receive, well wedged, and cemented so as to prevent the water from penetrating inside of the building.

The wooden Cornice including workmanship, materials furnished and scaffoldings, is in my opinion charged at a very moderate price.

The painting of the said cornice including sanding is worth  $.22 \frac{cts}{ft}$  per yard.

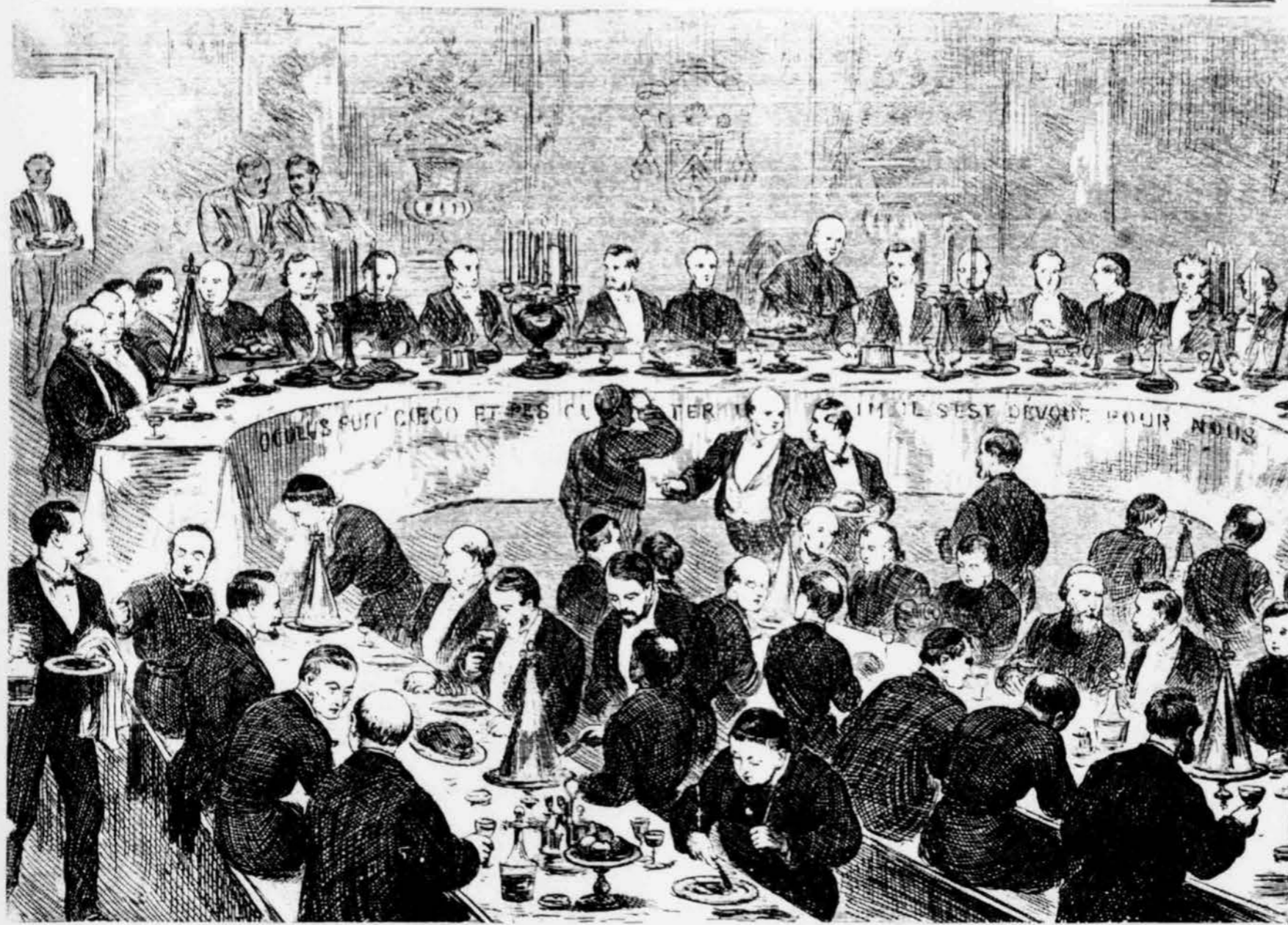
