

Comparative Growth

In the years from 1900 to 1910 Montreal has shown a greater percentage of growth than has any of the great cities of the United States.

The growth in Montreal's population since 1900 has represented an increase of 188,270 people, or 70.3 per cent.

New York has shown the greatest growth of any city in the United States. The percentage of increase in the same ten years being 38.7.

The Railways

Canada's great transcontinental railways, The Canadian Pacific and the Grand Trunk, make their headquarters in Montreal and are constantly adding to their local facilities for handling the immense volume of traffic to and from this port. The Canadian Pacific Railway with their eighty thousand employees, employ fourteen thousand of them in Montreal, and the local pay-roll amounts to about one million dollars per month. The Canadian Northern Railway terminal sites have been purchased and the operation of the road into Montreal is promised in two years.
