CUSTOMS INFORMATION

Returning Residents of the United States Regarding \$100.00 Exemption.

ACH returning resident of the United States is entitled to an exemption from duty on articles up to a total value of \$100 acquired outside the United States under the following conditions, if declared when the resident arrives at the United States port of entry : Provided they have been outside the United States not less than FORTY-EIGHT HOURS.

2. Provided they have had no previous exemption within

the past thirty days.
Provided the articles are for personal or household use, are not intended for sale, or as an order for others, or prohibited by law.

Provided they are acquired as an incident of the foreign journey. Foodstuffs, cigarettes, tobacco, 100 cigars, and not over one wine gallon of distilled spirits, wines or malt liquors (128 oz.) (Provided the quantity is not

prohibited by state law) may be included in this Articles belonging to one passenger cannot be included in the exemption of another, except that when members of a family residing in one household travel together on their return to the United States, the exemptions to which the several members of the family are entitled may be grouped and allowed without regard to which member is the owner, provided that

the grouped exemption shall not include that of any person who is not entitled to such an exemption, nor be allowed for the property of any such person. Articles worn or carried on the person having an aggregate value in excess of \$25, articles intended for future delivery, and articles sent forward in bond must be declared in writing at the port of entry at the time of the resident's return to the United States,

if the \$100 exemption is to be claimed for them. Goods which are rationed in the United States require the surrender of U.S. ration cards.

Declarations: Passengers may prepare customs de-claration at Windsor or C.N.R. Terminal Stations, offices of the United States Customs.

Should you require any further information, while in Montreal, consult the United States Customs Offices at the Windsor or C.N.R. Terminal Stations.

Advice to Visitors

The tram fare is seven cents in cash, or four tickets for twenty-five cents.

After midnight, the fare is ten cents cash; no tickets accepted. A book of thirty-two tickets can be purchased from the Montreal Tramways Co. for two dollars.

Transfers can be had to any point in city limits. All cars are pay-as-you-enter type.

In mailing letters, use Canadian Stamps only-four cents per ounce to U.S. and points outside Montreal in Canada. Postcards, three cents each.

Motor cars are not allowed on Mount Royal.
