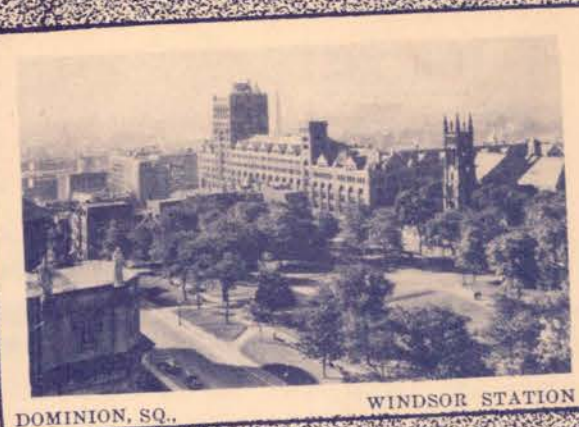

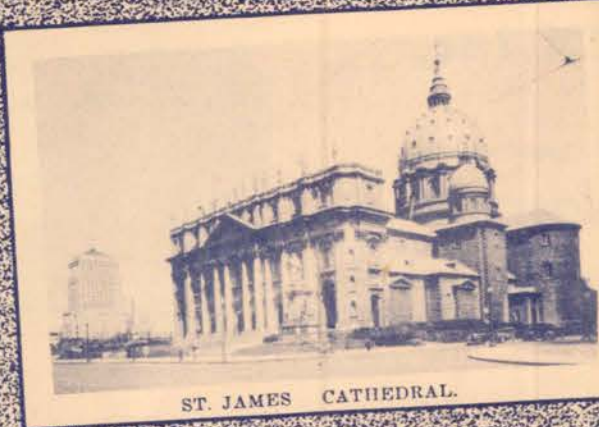

PLACES OF WORSHIP

ROMAN CATHOLIC (French and English) — St. James Cathedral Church of the Archdiocese of Montreal, Dorchester Street, at Dominion Square.

ROMAN CATHOLIC (French) — Church of Notre Dame de Ville-Marie, Place d'Armes. (Take Windsor car going south).

ROMAN CATHOLIC (English) — St. Patrick's Church, Dorchester Street at St. Alexander St.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND (Episcopalian) — Saint James the Apostle Church, 1439 St. Catherine West at Bishop.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND (Episcopalian) — Christ Church, Cathedral of the Diocese of Montreal, St. Catherine Street at Phillips Square.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND (Episcopalian) — Saint George's Church, Windsor and Osborne Streets, Dominion Square.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND (Episcopalian High Church) — Church of St. John the Evangelist, Ontario Street, at St. Urbain Street, near Bleury St.

GREEK ORTHODOX — Holy Trinity Church, Sherbrooke Street, at Clark.

PRESBYTERIAN — Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Sherbrooke St., West of Peel Street.

UNITED CHURCH — Saint James Church, St. Catherine St., near Phillips Square.

BAPTIST — First (Oliver) Church, Dorchester Street, at Guy Street.

UNITED CHURCH — Emmanuel Church, Drummond Street, near Sherbrooke Street.

UNITARIAN — Church of Messiah, Sherbrooke Street, near Guy Street.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE — Christian Science Church, 3650 Côte des Neiges. Take number 85 car going West.

TEMPLE EMMANUEL (Reformed Jewish Congregation) — 4128 Sherbrooke Street West, corner of Elm. Take St. Catherine 3A tram going west.

MONTREAL WAS

discovered in 1535 by Jacques Cartier, a French navigator. the site of the Indian village of Hochelaga. founded on May 18th, 1642, by Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve.

incorporated as a city in 1832. the seat of the Government of Canada for several years after the union of Upper and Lower Canada in 1841.

MONTREAL HAS

a population of more than 1,200,000. Greater Montreal has a population of more than 1,400,000.

a population of which more than two-thirds are of French origin.

a harbour extending 16 miles along the north shore of the St. Lawrence, having a water area of 12,000 acres, over ten miles of high level concrete piers and wharves, the harbour terminal railroad, with 58.5 miles of track (40 electrified); modern transit freight sheds, with a floor area of 2,000,063 square feet, 4 grain elevators with a combined storage capacity of 15,162,000 bushels, a 75-ton floating crane and nine steam-driven locomotive-type cranes, a floating dry-dock capable of accommodating ships of 25,000 tons, a cold storage warehouse with a capacity of 4,628,000 cubic feet, several well-equipped coal unloading plants and a fleet of tugs, dredges, derricks and scows.

motor coach lines and truck services with facilities between the city and all important points in Canada and the United States.

Dorval airport, near Montreal, with facilities for trans-Canada, Colonial Airlines and other airlines, linking the city with all parts of the world.

a public transportation system operated by the Montreal Tramways Company, having 256.73 miles of track and 76.7 miles of autobus routes in Montreal and district.

225 schools, with approximately 124,000 pupils under the jurisdiction of the Catholic School Commission of Montreal.

MONTREAL IS

named after Mont-Royal, or Mont-Real, the name Jacques Cartier gave to the mountain which overlooks the city.

on an island thirty miles long, between seven and ten miles wide, having an area of 194 square miles.

a city occupying about one-quarter of the island, being about fifty square miles in area.

thirteen miles in length, parallel to the St. Lawrence and stretching nine miles across the island to Rivière des Prairies, the largest city in Canada and the seventh in America.

the third largest French-speaking community in the world, situated at the head of ocean navigation in the St. Lawrence River about 1,000 miles from the ocean.

at the foot of inland navigation over the canal system and waterways which extend 1,200 miles into the heart of the continent.

the greatest inland port in the world and ranks second only to New York on this continent as a seaport.

connected with the mainland by thirteen bridges, the largest being the Jacques Cartier, Honoré Mercier, and Victoria Jubilee bridges.

a great industrial centre.

the headquarters of trans-Canada airlines.

the headquarters of three Life Insurance Companies.

CUSTOMS INFORMATION

for Returning Residents of the United States Regarding \$100.00 Exemption.

EACH returning resident of the United States is entitled to an exemption from duty on articles up to a total value of \$100 acquired outside the United States under the following conditions, if declared when the resident arrives at the United States port of entry:

1. Provided they have been outside the United States not less than FORTY-EIGHT HOURS.
2. Provided they have had no previous exemption within the past thirty days.
3. Provided the articles are for personal or household use, are not intended for sale, or as an order for others, or prohibited by law.
4. Provided they are acquired as an incident of the foreign journey.
5. Foodstuffs, cigarettes, tobacco, 100 cigars, and not over one wine gallon of distilled spirits, wines or malt liquors (128 oz.) (Provided the quantity is not prohibited by state law) may be included in this exemption.
6. Articles belonging to one passenger cannot be included in the exemption of another, except that when members of a family residing in one household travel together on their return to the United States, the exemptions to which the several members of the family are entitled may be grouped and allowed without regard to which member is the owner, provided that the grouped exemption shall not include that of any person who is not entitled to such an exemption, nor be allowed for the property of any such person.
7. Articles worn or carried on the person having an aggregate value in excess of \$25, articles intended for future delivery, and articles sent forward in bond must be declared in writing at the port of entry at the time of the resident's return to the United States, if the \$100 exemption is to be claimed for them.
8. Goods which are rationed in the United States require the surrender of U.S. ration cards.
9. Declarations: Passengers may prepare customs declaration at Windsor or C.N.R. Terminal Stations, offices of the United States Customs.

THE LOOKOUT

Atop Mount Royal a fine view of the City and the mighty St. Lawrence obtained from here. Reached by back to the top of the Mountain, by car to Shakespeare Road or hike up stairs at Peel Street.

MCGILL UNIVERSITY

McGill University, in a scenic setting, is the headquarters of Anglo-Saxon culture in Montreal. Founded in 1814 by James McGill, who had come from Glasgow, Scotland, and was one of the last fur-traders in Canada. Faculty of Medicine in 1824. Famous for its training to Medical Students and Postgraduates.

UNIVERSITE DE MONTREAL

The Université de Montréal, on the northern slope of Mount Royal, is a masterpiece of modern architecture and an active centre of French culture with a record of unquestioned achievement. It is directed by masters who are, for the most part, graduates from European or American Universities.

ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL

Opened to public worship in 1894. 333 feet long, 265 high, replica of St. Peter's at the Vatican.

MONTREAL LIBRARY

Built of Canadian marble. Largest dual language library in the world.

BONSECOURS MARKET

Here country folks gather on Tuesdays and Fridays to barter their wares.

ST. JOSEPH'S ORATORY

Better known as Brother André's Shrine erected in honour of St. Joseph. Mecca for tourists. Miraculous cures have taken place here.

ART GALLERY

Gallery of the Art Association. Permanent collection. Frequent exhibitions of contemporary art, and art projects.

NOTRE-DAME DE BONSECOURS

Better known as the Mariners' Shrine. The statue on the dome brought from France by Marguerite Bourgeoys.

CHATEAU RAMEZAY

Built in 1705 by Claude de Ramezay, Governor of Montreal. Occupied by Montgomery in 1775 during American Invasion. Now a splendid museum for Tourists. Ben Franklin made this his headquarters.

Advice to Visitors

The tram fare is seven cents in cash, or four tickets for twenty-five cents.

After midnight, the fare is ten cents cash; no tickets accepted. A book of thirty-two tickets can be purchased from the Montreal Tramways Co. for two dollars.

Transfers can be had to any point in city limits.

All cars are pay-as-you-enter type.

In mailing letters, use Canadian Stamps only—four cents per ounce to U.S. and points outside Montreal in Canada. Post-cards, three cents each.

Motor cars are not allowed on Mount Royal.

On Sundays, drug stores, tobacconists' shops, vaudeville, and motion picture shows are open.

Chief uptown post offices located at 678 St. Catherine Street West and 1420 St. Catherine Street West, five blocks each and five blocks west of Peel Street. General Post Office is on St. James Street.

The Customs House is located at 105 McGill Street. United States Customs Offices are located at Windsor and Canadian National Stations. Baggage not examined at these points will be forwarded to destination, if such is a bond port, for examination. If destination is not a bond port, inspection will be made at the frontier.

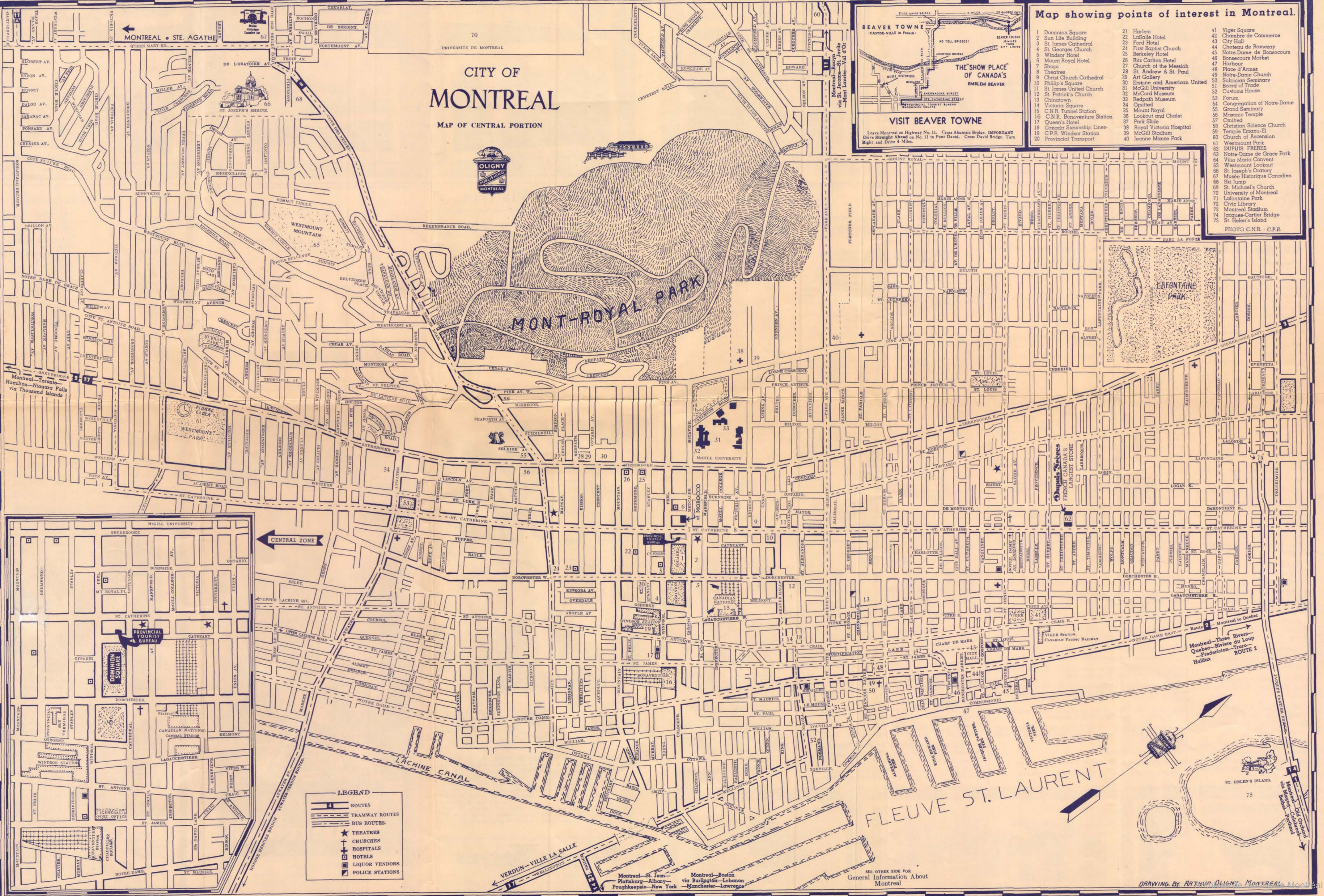
