





Nowhere in North America can be found such charm, such romance, such a strange mixture of the old and the new -as in Montreal.

Dating from 1536-the earliest days of its history, embracing the expedition of Jacques Cartier up the St. Lawrence, which resulted in the discovery of the Indian town of Hochelaga (now part of Montreal), which afterwards disappeared till about 1611, when Champlain arrived with his expedition. and the naming of the mountain as Mount Royal, from which the name of Montreal is derived; the landing on the 18th of May, 1642, of Maisonneuve and his little band of religious enthusiasts upon the spot where Montreal Customs House was afterwards erected and planted in the words of the saintly Vimont: "A grain of mustard seed destined to overshadow the land," through to the days in 1672 when streets were first regularly laid; withstanding the early terrors and alarms with the Indians; the Seven Years War which, after a long and trying struggle, resulted in the Treaty of Paris and the definite placing of the Colony in 1763 under the flag of Great Britain, is the fabric from which Montreal's history is woven.

And so that the thousands who yearly travel from far distances to this city of incomparable attractions, may see everything, may not miss one single point of interest, the Gray Line has carefully arranged a series of trips that cover everything, short travels in magnificent parlour coaches that unfold by sight the interesting, long-to-be-remembered history of Montreal.

Long experience plus an unusual degree of willingness to serve, has won for the Gray Line an enviable reputation, for no city in North America can boast of a sightseeing service better than that to be found here. 

HE PRESENT CITY HALL replaces, since 1926, the former municipal palace erected in 1878 and destroyed, on the 3rd of March, 1922, by a fire which practically left but the walls standing. These walls were raised and used in the new structure.

One of the most remarkable features of this building is the large Hall of Honour, on the first floor, to which the central stairway gives access. The flooring of this hall is of Campan marble extracted from the Pyrenees and presents a splendid sight; the electrolier and candelabra have been supplied by the firm Sony, Duval & Compagnie, of Paris; the walls are lined with granite d'or marble from Burgundy.

The Council-Room also deserves a special mention, with its throne and panels of teakwood, its walls of travertine from France, its artistic ceiling and symbolic stained glasswindows.



cGILL UNIVERSITY owes its origin to a private endowment. It was founded by the Hon. James McGill, a leading merchant and public-spirited citizen of Montreal, who died in 1813. By his will dated January 8, 1811, he bequeathed his property of Burnside, consisting of 46 acres of land with the dwelling house and other buildings thereon, and a sum of £10,000 in money, to found a college. A Royal Charter, obtained in 1821 and conferring University powers, established one of the foremost seats of learning in North America. The University has several very interesting museums, the most outstanding of which is the McCord National Museum relating to Canadian history. #### CITY TOUR

In planning our City Tour, we have endeavored to show our visitors that we live in a progressive, cosmopolitan city. Montreal is different from any other city in the world; besides having all the other attractions of a world port, it harbors two distinct peoples. The French Canadian race, the first to settle here, is responsible for the old, quaint section of the city, and, as time went on, the English settlers came, and the two races grew side by side. Today they intermingle in all the districts of Montreal, but the quaint French district still remains intact.

Our City Tour starts from Dominion Square, the centre of the uptown retail section and takes in the uptown shopping and theatrical district, the wholesale and financial centre, passes through the heart of the old French district, takes in some of the city's best parks and playgrounds, gives you a view of the harbor from the viaduct on Notre Dame Street, and encircles Mount Royal. Stops are made at the Notre Dame Church, the old fur store on St. Denis Street, Brother Andre's shrine, and the Westmount Lookout, from where one gets an excellent view of the western section of the city. the Victoria Bridge, and many miles of the St. Lawrence River, a most picturesque sight. The Tour also takes in many educational buildings, including McGill University and the University of Montreal, and passes through the Cities of Outremont and Westmount, both of these cities being entirely surrounded by the City of Montreal.

The trip is taken in luxurious motor coaches, takes two hours to complete, and the cost is \$1.00.

### LACHINE TOUR

Our Lachine Tour is an afternoon and evening trip and proceeds from our starting point along the Boulevard, through the western section of the City, following the Road of Remembrance to Montreal West, thence to Stoney Point, Lachine, from where a view of the beautiful Lake St. Louis can be had.

Lachine is the French word for China. Lachine was founded in the year 1666 by Lasalle who, in attempting to find a route to China, was stopped by the rapids—hence the name.

The return trip crosses the Lachine Canal and follows the Lower Lachine Road along the banks of the St. Lawrence River passing the famous Lachine Rapids, through the City of Verdun, back to Montreal. — 2 hours — Fare, \$1.00.

HE OLD TOWERS of the Grand Seminary of Montreal, known since it was founded in 1657 as the Seminary of St. Sulpice, form one of the most interesting eights of the City.

The ancient seminary at one time owned a fortified Indian Mission post, built in 1694. Around it clustered the village of the Indian converts—the two quaint towers in the grounds of Montreal College on Sherbrooke Street being all that remains of the historic place.

The original quaint Seminary of St. Sulpice still adjoins the Parish Church of Notre Dame, but Montreal College on Sherbrooke Street is now the main home.







ONSECOURS MARKET is one of the town sights on a market day because of the scenes of French Canadian provincial life. Thither on Tuesday and Friday the country habitants flock, with their little carts and their homespun clothing. Amid the noise of Norman dialect, over the "trente sous", the "neuf francs", or the "un écu", one catches glimpses. through the jostling crowds, of piles of native tobacco, maple sugar, ducks, chickens and garlic, straw hats and home-made rocking chairs, rosaries and cheap jewellery. At Eastertide the display of enormous beeves, decorated with paper roses, delights the hearts of the children. The lover of human nature will observe a thousand studies of character in an early morning's push through these crowds.

Here Bonsecours Church—Montreal's oldest church—is also situated.



N THE south of Place d'Armes stands the parish church of Notre Dame. The church was built in 1824 to take the place of an earlier structure dating back to 1672. The existing church is 255 feet long and 134 feet wide, and accommodates 10,000 worshippers. Its twin towers (227 ft.) contain ten bells, one of which, known as "Le Gros Bourdon," weighs 24,780 lbs., the largest in America. Beside the Church stands the historic Seminary of St. Sulpice, one of the few remaining relics of the days of French rule. This ancient building is now used for the offices of the Order of St. Sulpice whose founder, Abbé Olier, sent out Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve, in 1641 to establish the missionary enterprise which afterwards developed into the City of Montreal.



T. JAMES' CATHEDRAL is a copy of St. Peter's of Rome, of which it is one quarter the dimensions. The Cathedral is built in the orm of a cross, 330 feet long and 222 wide.
Over the portico will be noticed thirteen statues in bronze. These were donated by different parishes. The names of the statues are as follows: St. James, St. Joseph, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Vincent de Paul, St. Long the Europealist St. Paul St. Th. St. John the Evangelist, St. Paul, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Patrick, St. Charles Borromée, St. John the Baptist, St. Hyacinthe, and St. Ignatius. The dome is 70 feet in diameter at its base and its summit is 210 feet from the spectators on the floor of the Church. It is an exact copy of its famous prototype in Rome.



#### FORT CHAMBLY AND AIRPORT TOUR

On this tour we cross over the famous new Montreal Harbor Bridge that connects Montreal, St. Helen's Island and Longueuil, and continue on to the government airport at St. Hubert, where a stop of fifteen minutes is made. The tour proceeds to Chambly-a beautiful spot on the Richelieu River -rich in historical interest. Here we visit the famous Fort Chambly, the oldest fort on the American Continent, near which is a military cemetery wherein rest soldiers of General John Thomas' American Army of 1776.

The return trip follows along the St. Lawrence through to St. Lambert and enters the city again over the Victoria Jubilee Bridge, and back to the starting point. A very delightful three-hour tour. Daily at 2.00 p.m. Fare, \$2.00.



### SHOOTING THE RAPIDS TOUR

A very unique and interesting tour combining a motor coach drive through a section of Montreal to the Lachine Wharf, and the exhilarating experience of shooting the famous Lachine Rapids on the S.S. Empress. The Lachine Rapids are the largest on the St. Lawrence River and fall 56 feet in the course of about two miles. The steamer plunges along the breakers and the headlong current carries her through the rapids into the placid waters, under the famous Victoria Bridge and into the world renowned harbour of Montreal. Here one sees the great harbour front with its miles of docks, towering elevators, scores of ocean-going liners from every corner of the globe. and large palatial passenger liners. Here you transfer to the





### WEST ISLAND TOUR

### INDIAN RESERVATION TOUR



This beautiful three and a half hour tour is operated daily at 2.00 p.m.—Rate, \$2.50.


### LAURENTIAN MOUNTAIN TOUR




ARBOUR OF MONTREAL-A view of a portion of the harbour taken from the New

The Port of Montreal is the largest inland port in the world, being approximately one thousand miles from the sea. It is the second largest port in America and handles more grain than any other port in the world. It has a grain conveyor system by which twentythree vessels can be loaded simultaneously. Enormous grain elevators are provided, and the port also has one of the largest cold storage plants in the world.

There are twenty-eight permanent fireproof transit sheds along approximately nine miles of deep-draught wharf. Some piers are 1,250 feet long by 320 feet wide, and the port has berth accommodation for approximately one Ahundred-ocear-linars/at one time/ontrea
