**A PLAN of the CITY and FORTIFICATIONS, of
LOUISBURG,**
from a Survey made by RICHARD GRIDLEY,
Lieut. Coll. of the Train of Artillery in 1745.
*This important Fort was taken on the 17th of June
1758, after a Siege of 43 Days, by Nine Regiments
that were Raised & Equiped in 30 Days in New England,
and commanded by Sr WILL^m Pepperill, assisted by a
Fleet under the Command of Commodore Warren,
with the loss of 101 Men killed, and 30 that died by
Sickness. This Place was afterwards
restored to the French by the
Treaty of Air la Chapelle.*
