It is strictly forbidden to leave in any place of this market, from the hour of closing till ten o'clock p.m., any summer or winter vehicle, box, barrel, produce, animal, forage, grain, provision, effect or article of trade generally, brought to the ^{said} market.

Any person contravening this rule shall be liable to the penalty provided by law.
