M E M O I R E

Les bataillons anglais renferment un certain nombre de soldats canadiens-français.

Depuis l'autorisation des bataillons français, ces soldats demandent à y permuter. La discipline militaire voudrait que dans chaque cas le requérant adressât sa demande à son Commandant d'abord.

A cause de leur peu d'instruction, et de l'ignorance à peu près complète où ils sont des règlements militaires, les soldats au contraire, font leurs demandes au Commandant du bataillon où ils désirent permuter. Cela crée une situation très délicate à tous les intéressés:

- 1o. Au soldat lui-même, passible de punition pour infraction à la discipline;
- 2o. Au Commandant du bataillon canadien-français, incapable de répondre sans s'exposer au soupçon de vouloir nuire à un bataillon rival.
- 3o. Au Commandant du bataillon anglais, placé entre son intérêt et celui de la justice.

Le 163e a reçu à lui seul des demandes de permutation de cinq bataillons de l'Alberta, de plusieurs bataillons d'Ontario et d'un bataillon du Québec. Chacune de ces demandes a donné lieu à une assez longue correspondance qui, la plupart du temps, n'a eu d'autre résultat que de créer une tension dans les rapports du

Commandant

du Commandant avec ses collègues du bataillon anglais.

Le motif allégué à l'appui des demandes de permutation est presque toujours le même:

Isolément du Canadien-Français parmi des gens de langue, de religion et de mœurs différentes; impossibilité d'avancer; désir de se rapprocher des centres canadiens-français, où sont généralement stationnés les bataillons de langue française.

Les deux derniers bataillons en date, le 230^e de Salaberry, et celui de Leprohon, recevront certainement un grand nombre de demandes de permutation de ^{envoies} Canadiens engagés dans les bataillons d'Ontario et de l'Ouest respectivement, mais pour des raisons de parenté, de camaraderie, etc., un certain nombre de soldats continueront à s'adresser au 163^e.

Le Lt. Col. Desrosiers et le Major Asselin sont d'accord avec le Lt. Col. de Salaberry, sans doute aussi avec le Lt. Col. Leprohon (qu'ils n'ont pas eu l'avantage de consulter), en demandant qu'à l'avenir la permutation des soldats de langue française d'un bataillon anglais à un bataillon français soit considérée comme un droit, à la seule condition que la demande vienne spontanément du soldat sans sollicitation aucune.

À part son caractère peu satisfaisant, la correspondance ^{relative aux permutations,} telle qu'elle se pratique actuellement, touchant les permutations, fait perdre aux Commandants intéressés, un temps extrêmement précieux.

MEMO re Major O. Asselin's personal expenses.

Major Oliver Asselin, of the Canadian Overseas Forces, was recalled from the Front, where he had been serving with the 87th (Grenadier Guards) Battalion for two months after a previous term of service with the 22nd, at the request of the Hon. Mr. Doherty, who wished him to form part of the Canadian Delegation to Paris. He has expressed a desire to remain in the army until the demobilization of his unit, to which both the Hon. Mr. Doherty and the military authorities have agreed. He would now like to have his situation with respect to personal expenses defined.

Major Asselin while on duty with the Canadian Delegation, will be drawing the pay and separation allowance of his rank, amounting to £190 per month. He will not draw the usual subsistence allowance of £30. He is now staying at Claridge's with the Hon. Mr. Doherty at the expense of the British Government, and will be living in Paris at the hotel selected and under the conditions arranged ^{for} for the rest of the Canadian Delegation.

He represents, that, in all fairness, his pay and his separation allowance should, in future as in the past, be considered as the remuneration of his services, and he should not be called upon to draw on them for expenses incidental upon his official duties; that, outside of and apart from such as will be chargeable to the public in common with the rest of the Delegation, and as a result of his official duties, he, like the other members of the Delegation for that matter, will be put to personal expenses which he could not reasonably be expected to face out of his private funds. These expenses, which he states will arise from the practical impossibility in which he will forcibly find himself to be with the other members of the Delegation, at all times and under all possible circumstances throughout the Peace Conference, he estimates at a minimum of \$5 per diem, which, under the unprecedented conditions created by the Conference, may rise to as much as \$10 per diem.

As a satisfactory adjustment of the matter he suggests one of two possible courses. One of these is that he should be granted personal expense allowance

by the Canadian Department of External Affairs, ^A The other is that he should be regarded as a military attaché and, as such, granted a special living allowance by the Overseas Militia Department. He adds that, failing either of these or any other reasonable solution, he would, to his deep regret, be compelled to decline the great honour of accompanying the Minister of Justice to the Conference - a sacrifice to him the greater as, after two terms of service at the front he forsook the pleasure of eventually marching into Germany with his battalion in order to answer the Hon. Mr. Doherty's personal call.

In view of the impending departure of the Delegation for Paris, he would respectfully request that his application be taken into consideration at the earliest possible moment.

MEMORANDUM FOR MAJOR ASSELIN.

1. Sir Robert Borden wishes you to accompany him to Paris on Saturday, January 11th. The exact time and place of departure from London will be notified later, but the train will probably leave about 10 o'clock in the morning. Tickets will be provided at the station.
2. Your passport should be handed immediately to Mr. Boyce, Assistant Private Secretary to Sir Robert Borden, in order that it may be viséd.
3. You should provide yourself before leaving London with three (3) photographs (passport size) for the purpose of the official British Delegation pass book which will be issued to you in Paris.
4. Your baggage should be labelled c/o British Delegation, Hotel Majestic, Paris.
5. It is suggested that you provide yourself with French currency for any contingencies on the journey. There is a branch of Lloyd's Bank at the Hotel Majestic, Paris, and debits and credits there could be arranged through the Bank of Montreal in London.

MAJOR OLIVAR ASSELIN

Born 1874 at St. Hilarion, Co. Charlevoix, P. Q.

Was offered the Command of an infantry battalion in the fall of 1915. Undertook to raise the 163d on condition that that the command be given to an officer from the front and that he himself should take second rank. Served with 163d in Bermuda from May 25 to Nov. 17, 1916. With same unit at Bramshott and then with 10th Reserve at Shoreham from Dec. 5, 1916, to March 6, 1917. With 22nd at the front from March 8 to July 7, ¹⁹¹⁷. On Canadian Military Mission in Paris from Aug. 1st to Nov. 15, 1917. With 2nd Quebec Depot, Witley, and 10th Reserve, Bramshott, from December, 1917, to October, 1918. With 87th Can. Grenadier Guards at the front from Oct. 22 to Dec. 26th, 1918. Attached to Canadian Delegation at Peace Conference from Jan. 1st to April 25, 1919. Demobilized June 8, ¹⁹¹⁹. Was at No. 14 General Hospital at Wimereux, near Boulogne, in May, 1917, for trench fever. At Granville Special Hospital, Buxton, Derbyshire, in August and Sept., 1918, for knee trouble. A captain from Procton, Staffordshire, Military School. Knight Legion of Honour.

In civil life, Major Asselin was a professional journalist before the war. Is now connected with a bond dealers' firm in Montreal. Married. Three boys.

MAJOR ASSELIN'S MILITARY RECORD

When asked by the Minister of Militia, in November 1915, if he, a well-known Nationalist, would be willing to raise a battalion, he accepted at once. He was then 41 years old, had a family, and had had military experience as a volunteer in the Spanish American war. He declined the command, however, asking that it be given as a reward to one who had done good service at the front. He was appointed a Major 14-11-15, and as such he raised the 163rd Battalion, with which he served in Bermuda from May 29th 1916, to November 17th, same year.

Immediately after arriving in England, on December 5, 1916, he insisted upon being sent to the front, offering to revert to a lieutenancy if necessary. While second in command of the 10th Reserve Battalion, he was, by Gen. Turner's ~~xxxxx~~ personal authority, attached to the 22nd at the front for instructional purposes. He served with the 22nd from March 6th to July 1917, as platoon commander. Having been stricken with trench fever, he could not be absorbed, owing to poor health. Several witnesses, including Capt. Chaballe, now C. C. 5th Garrison Battalion, at Quebec, could testify to personal deeds of courage, such as frequently won decorations in this war. One of these was the conducting of a working party through communication trenches at Neuville St Vaast under a heavy destructive fire on April 8, 1917. Another was the extricating of his platoon from a dangerous position under intense artillery fire, ~~in broad daylight~~ in sight of the

enemy, with a certain saving of a number of lives.

As a member of the Canadian Military Mission in Paris, from August 1st to November 15th 1917, Major Asselin, under Brig-Gen. Lord Brooke, did valuable work towards making Canada's effort at home and on the battlefields fully appreciated in France, and stimulating patriotism at home by spreading these appreciations of the Canadians, in the Canadian press.

Towards the end of last summer, after a short stay in hospital with knee trouble, Major Asselin offered to revert to a captaincy in order to return to the front.- He was serving with the 87th as a captain when recalled at the request of Hon. C. J. Doherty.

Lt-Col. deMartigny, who was with the 22nd when Maj. Asselin was attached to that unit, states as O.C. of the 10th Reserve Battalion:-

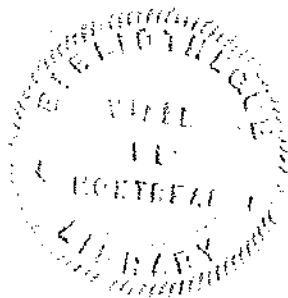
" I know of Major Asselin's work both here and in France. Quick to learn, very willing, a man of many parts, with considerable military knowledge, he is energetic and can handle men? I consider him a devoted, loyal and useful officer."

Lt-Col. formerly Brig-Gen. Frank Meighen, states as O.C. 87th Canadian Grenadier Guards Battalion:-

" Major Asselin has served some months with the 87th Battalion Canadian Grenadier Guards, and during that time his work has been of the highest quality. Everything given him to do was well done, with energy and efficiency."

Brig-Gen. Lord Brooke, commanding the Canadian Military Mission to ~~xxxxxx~~ Paris, writes:-

" Major Asselin served for months in Paris as a member of the Canadian Military Mission attached to the French Government. During the period his distinguished and tactful services went a long way to the success of the Mission. A most efficient and painstaking officer, with a high sense of duty."
