George the Fourth by the grace of God of the
United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King
Defender of the Faith To our trusty and right well
beloved Cousin and Councillor George Earl of Dal-
housie of that part of our United Kingdom called
Scotland Knight Grand Cross of the most Honorable
Military Order of the Bath Lieutenant General of
our Forces Greeting Know you that we reposing
especial trust and confidence in the prudence cou-
rage and Loyalty of you the said George Earl of
Dalhousie of our especial grace certain knowledge
and wise motion have thought fit to constitute
and appoint you to be our Captain General and
Governor in Chief in and over our province of Upper
Canada and in and over our province of Lower
Canada respectively, bounded by a line to commence
at a stone boundary on the north bank of the
Lake St. Francis at the Cove west of the Point
du Baudet in the limits between the township
of Lancaster and the Seigneurie of New Long-
ville running along the said limit in the direc-
tion of North thirty-four degrees west to the western
most angle of the said Seigneurie of New Longue-
ville thence along the north western boundary of

the

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the Seigneurie of Vandreuil running north twenty-five degrees east until it strikes the Ottawa River to ascend the said river into the Lake Temiscauing and from the head of the said Lake by a line drawn due north until it strikes the boundary line of Hudson's Bay the Province of Upper Canada to comprehend all such lands Territories and Islands lying to the westward of the said line of division as were part of our Province of Quebec and the province of Lower Canada to comprehend all such lands Territories and Islands lying to the eastward of the said line of division as were part of our said province of Quebec.

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

EARL OF DALHOUSIE.

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The (9th) Earl of Dalhousie, G.C.B.
(Captain General of the Forces in North America.)

Ramsey George. Born 22nd October 1770. Son of the 8th Earl. Succeeded his father in the peerage in 1787. Entered the army in 1789; served at Gibraltar and Martinique, where he was severely wounded in 1795, and in consequence returned to England. His next service was in Ireland, during the rebellion of 1798. In the following year he accompanied the expedition to the Helder, and was present in all the actions of the campaign in Holland. In 1800 he received the brevet of colonel, and was employed before Belle Isle, at Minorca, and afterwards in Egypt under Sir Ralph Abercromby, where he took part in the severe actions of Aboukir and Alexandria. In 1808 Lord Dalhousie served in the expedition to the Scheldt. He commanded the seventh division under Wellington in the Peninsula, was engaged in the battles of Vittoria and in the Pyrenees, and in other important actions, and was one of the general officers who received the thanks of parliament. Was present at the battle of Waterloo. He was appointed a knight grand cross of the Bath, and was created a peer of the United Kingdom in 1815. In the following year he was appointed to the command in Nova Scotia, and in 1819 was nominated Captain-general and Governor in chief of the forces in North America. He attained the full rank of General in 1830.

Died 21st March 1838.
