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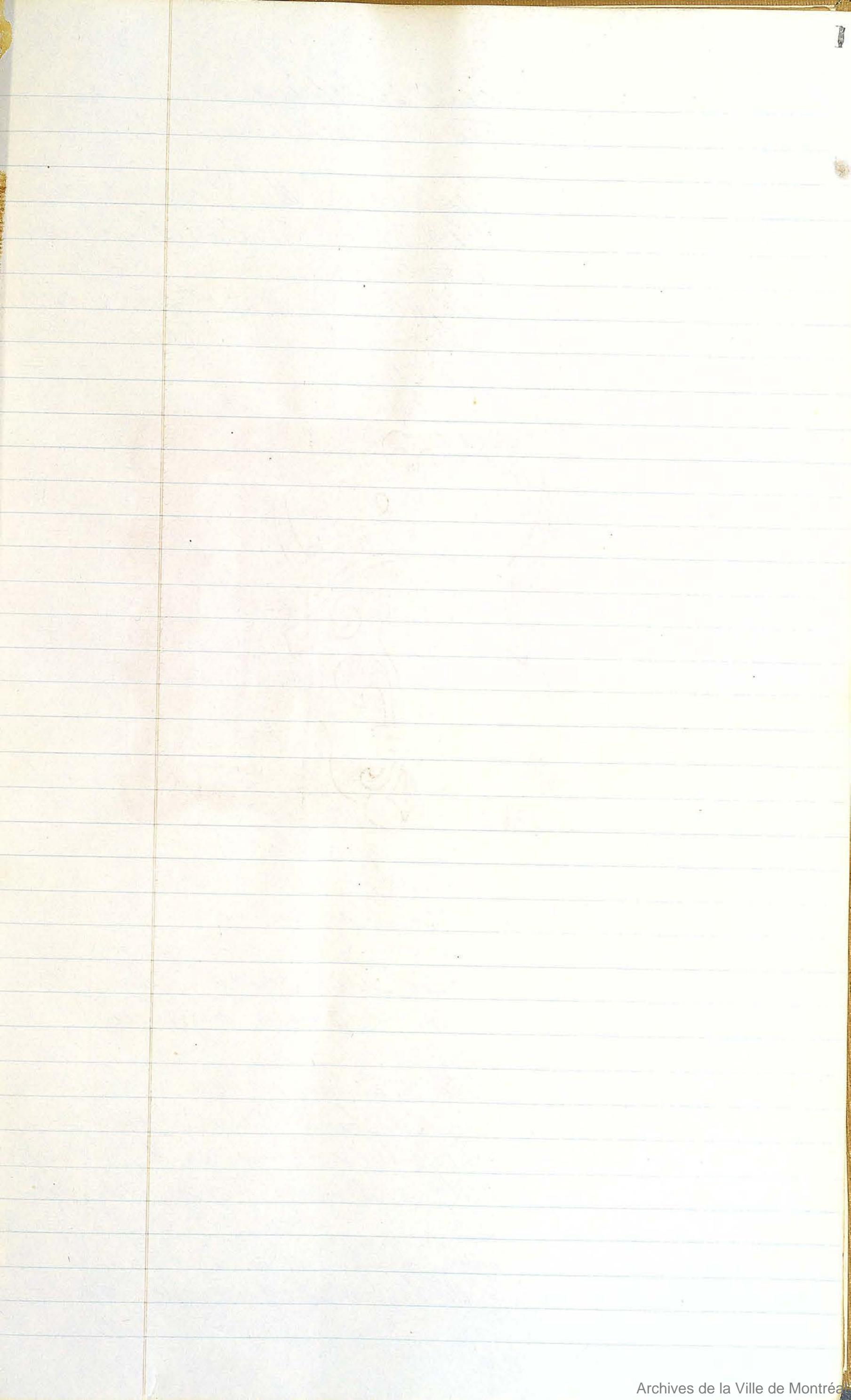

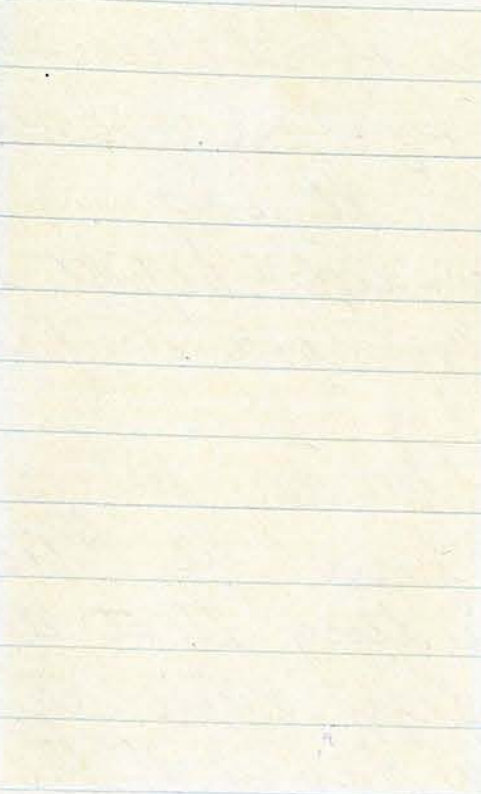

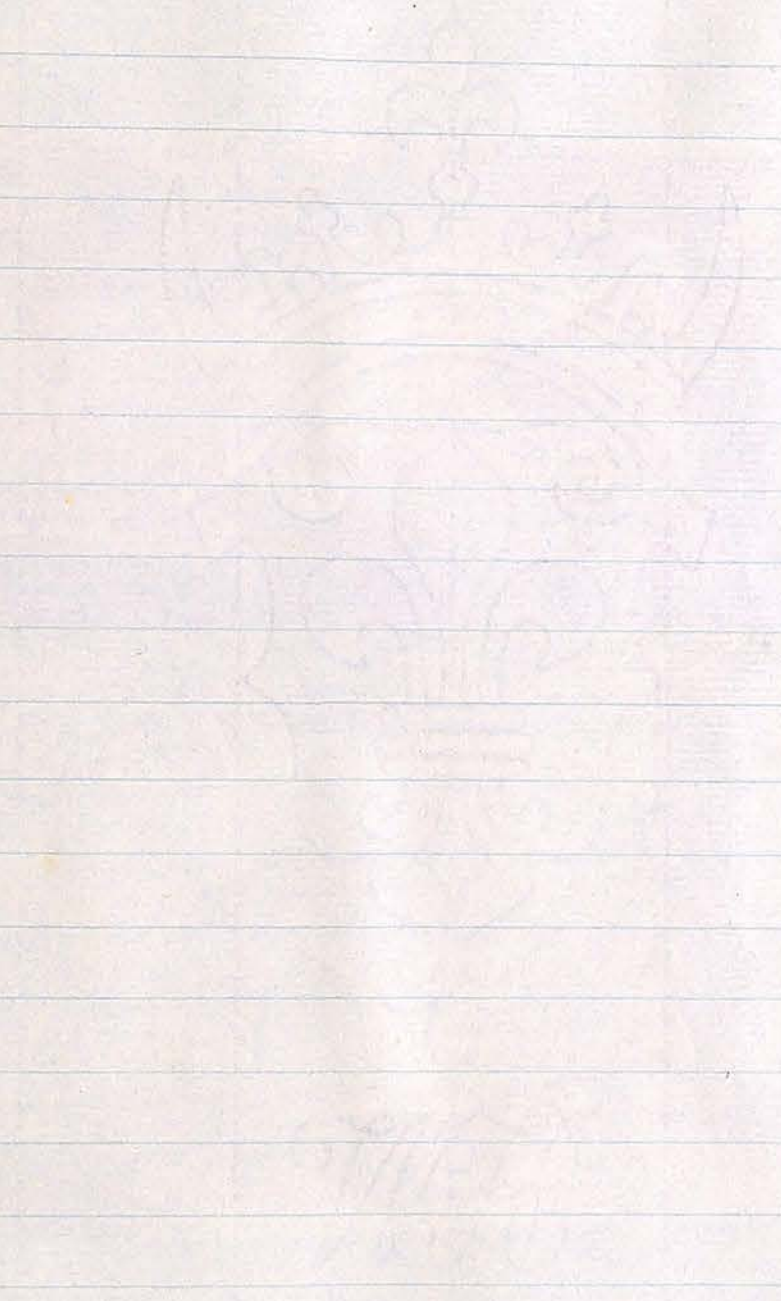

tion of the amounts necessary to meet the  
expenses of the current year, by providing

- 1.<sup>st</sup> For the payment of the interest, and sums  
required for the sinking fund on the  
debt due by the City.
- 2.<sup>nd</sup> For the general and ordinary expenses of the City.
- 3.<sup>rd</sup> For the sums required for contemplated improvements.
- 4.<sup>th</sup> For a Reserve of not less than five per cent  
to meet unforeseen expenditure.

Such appropriation shall never exceed the  
amount of the receipts from the preceding  
year added to the balance of the said re-  
ceipts which shall not have been expended.

It shall not be lawful for the said  
Council to expend beyond the amount  
so appropriated and the amount of  
the other sums at their disposal out  
of the receipts of the current year, except  
in cases and under the conditions  
hereinafter set forth, but the Council  
may at any time vary the application  
of



of the sums set apart for improvements, and make use of the amount reserved for unforeseen expenditure.

The Mayor and Councillors who shall have sanctioned the expenditure of any sum of money beyond the amounts appropriated and the amounts at their disposal, in conformity with the foregoing enactments, shall alone be personally responsible therefor.

In making out the appropriation for the Police Committee, Your Committee, in view of the loud and numerous demands for an augmentation of the Force, deemed it expedient to increase the strength of the Constabulary force by fifteen men; but this could only be done by reducing the pay of the men from four shillings and six pence to three shillings and nine pence per day, which Your Committee have done and for which they have to ask the sanction of the Council.

By referring to the above statement, it will be seen that there is granted to the Road Committee for keeping the roads in order and for general improvements this year only \$14309.02. an amount altogether insufficient to meet the numerous demands upon that Department; but it is all that could be spared for that Department after providing for the interest of the debt and the sinking fund, the general expenses of the other Departments of the Corporation and the reserve fund as they were ~~bound~~ bound to do under the new Law.

Under those circumstances Your Committee recommend directed their



attention towards finding out some mode of making up the amount required to enable the Road Committee to carry on the works of the year: the only means, in their opinion, of attaining the object in view, is by effecting a small loan, and as the Council have now a Bill before the Legislature asking for authority to borrow certain sums of money and amongst others one for £25,000 for drainage purposes, it occurred to your Committee that if that amount were turned from currency into sterling giving the Corporation the privilege of applying the difference to the repair of streets and general improvements during the present year, it would afford the proper remedy to an evil which is not likely to occur another year, as more care will probably be taken to collect the revenue this and every succeeding year when the stringency of the new law is expected to be felt.

Your Committee therefore recommend that an amendment to that effect be asked to be introduced in the Bill above referred to.

Upon the accompanying Petitions of the proprietors of real estate in St. John, Saint Nicholas St. Sacrament, St. Alexis, Port, Hospital and parts of Notre Dame and Great St. James Street, who pray that the Council will extend St. John Street from its present termination at Notre Dame Street to Great St. James Street, and stating their willingness to be assessed for such portion of the damages and expenses of the improvement as the Council may deem necessary.

Your Committee having considered the above Petition and ascertained from the City Treasurer that the owners of the majority of real estate in the different streets mentioned therein had signed the same, are of opinion that the continuation of St. John Street as proposed would confer a great boon to that locality, and should be immediately carried into effect. In order to enable Your Committee to form a correct estimate of the land required for this object, they instructed the City Surveyor to make a survey and plan of the improvement which is herewith submitted showing that strips of land will be required from the properties of Mrs. Widow Sancerre, and Mr. A. Pissillors together



together with a small triangular piece of the rear of Mr. Brumari's property, they therefore recommend that they be invested by the Council with authority to acquire by verdict of jury, the whole of Mrs. Widow Sancever's property thro' which the street will pass, and as much of Mr. Bisailon's as may be required for the improvement, with power to make such arrangements with Mr. Brumari for the acquisition of his ground on such terms as they may consider just and reasonable.

Your Committee would here state that a communication has been received from Mr. Bisailon in which he expresses his readiness to allow the amount of indemnity to remain in the hands of the Corporation during his lifetime receiving yearly the interest off that amount.

Besides being one of local interest, it is in the opinion of Your Committee, an improvement of great public advantage and as such the expense of it should be borne in the following proportions, viz. two thirds by the proprietors to be benefitted thereby, and the remaining one third by the Corporation.

be received under the same, shall depend  
on the number of persons who, not having  
been previously successfully vaccinated,  
shall be successfully vaccinated by  
such medical practitioners or medical  
practitioners, respectively so contracting."

The same act further provides that  
the Council of each such City shall  
appoint a convenient place in each  
ward of such City for the performance,  
at least once in each month, of such  
vaccination, and shall take effective  
means



" Means for giving, from time to time,  
 " to all persons Resident within each  
 " such ward, due notice of the days and  
 " hours at which the Medical practitioner or  
 " one of the Medical practitioners contrac-  
 " ted with for such purpose will attend,  
 " once at least in each month, at such place,  
 " to vaccinate all persons not successfully  
 " vaccinated who may then appear there,  
 " and also of the days and hours at  
 " which such Medical practitioner will  
 " attend at such place to inspect the pro-  
 " gress of such vaccination in the persons  
 " so vaccinated."

It is also provided in the said Act "that in  
 " all contracts to be made under the provisions of  
 " this Act, the sums contracted to be paid shall not  
 " be more than twenty-five cents for every person  
 " successfully vaccinated, including all or any  
 " of the Certificates required by this Act."

Further more the Act in question makes it  
 obligatory on all Parents, from and after the  
 1<sup>st</sup> January next (1862) to have their children  
 vaccinated within three calendar months  
 after their birth; consequently no time should  
 be lost in giving effect to the Law.

Your Committee deem it their duty  
 to call the attention of the Council upon  
 the above cited Act and to suggest the means  
 of carrying it out.

They therefore recommend that the  
 following gentlemen with whom  
 Your Committee have been in negotiation  
 and whose consent has been obtained  
 be appointed for the purposes of said  
 Act,

APPROPRIATION FOR STONES AND PINE DEALS.  
The Finance Committee reported that as directed by the City Council, they had considered the accompanying Report of the Road Committee to be authorised to contract for 3,000 toises of Banc Rouge or whyn broken stone, and 2,000 toises of grey stone, and also for 30,000 pieces of pine cull deals for the roads; and in view of the provisions of the Act passed at the last session of Parliament, restricting the Annual Expenditure of the Council within certain limits, and in the absence of correct data by which to ascertain what amount will be available for improvements in the coming civic year, the Committee did not feel justified in sanctioning such a large outlay as that asked for by the Road Committee; but as it is indispensably necessary that a certain quantity of stone and deals be procured to keep the roads in order next summer, and the same may be had on far more advantageous terms, if contracted for during the present season, the Committee recommended that the Road Committee be authorized to contract for 1,500 toises of grey stone, and 500 toises of Banc Rouge or whyn stone, and that an appropriation of \$4,000 be also granted to them to purchase pine cull deals for footpaths.

The Finance Committee respectfully report,  
That, in the year 1850, the Corporation of this city, with a view to promote the completion of the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad, resolved to subscribe for 5,000 shares of the stock of the Company which was then formed, representing a capital of £125,000, for which the Corporation issued their bonds in favour of the said Company, payable as follows, viz:—

£25,000 in seven years.  
Do. in nine years.  
Do. in eleven years.  
Do. in thirteen years.  
Do. in fifteen years.

It being understood that, as the Bonds became due, a corresponding number of shares should be sold to meet their payment, and that to preclude the possibility of any loss to the Corporation, a further number of shares, say 1,000, should be vested in trust, in the name of a third party, that as many of them might be sold, as would be necessary from time to time, to make up a year's arrears of interest, and any deficiency between the amounts realized for the sale of shares held by the Corporation, and their par value.

That subsequently the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad Company was by Act of Parliament merged into the G. T. R. R. Company, the latter assuming, of course, the liabilities of the former Company, and amongst others that consequent upon the issue of the Bonds above referred to.

That the two first instalments of the said Bonds amounting to £50,000 were punctually paid by the G. T. R. R., as well as the interest, until the 1st April last, when the G. T. R. R. stopped payment of the same. The Corporation had, therefore, to provide for the said interest, in order to save the credit of the city.

The same thing occurred in regard to the third instalment of £25,000, due on the 1st October last, which had to be provided for by the Corporation, to avoid the painful perspective of having the City Bonds protested.

As the G. T. R. R. may not be in a position to meet the liability in question for some time to come, and it is obvious that the Revenue of the city is inadequate to satisfy or meet the demand thus unexpectedly thrust upon the City Treasurer, unless by means of an additional tax upon the citizens, it has occurred to your committee that the best way of meeting the difficulty would be to obtain authority from the Legislature to issue new Bonds to replace those formerly granted to the St. Lawrence and Atlantic R. R. Company, as the same become due, including the £25,000 due on the 1st October last, the said new Bonds payable in a given space of time, say a period not exceeding 20 years; provision being made to save and preserve all existing rights and privileges of the Corporation, and any recourse they may have against the G. T. R. R. Co'y. or any others in respect of the said Bonds.

Your committee therefore recommend that provisions to that effect be made in the amendments to the Act of Incorporation to be asked for at the next session of Parliament.

THE TERMINUS QUESTION—LETTER OF MR. WATKIN TO THE MAYOR.

His Worship the Mayor read the following letter to the Council:—

QUEBEC, March 28, 1862.

SIR,—May I beg the great favor of your informing the City of Montreal how much the Grand Trunk Railway Company regrets the delay which, from no fault of theirs has arisen in reference to the commencement of the works of the McGill Street extension, towards which the Council so liberally decided in October last to subscribe, in accordance with the existing agreement with the Corporation.

I had imagined at the date of the Council's resolution of October last, and at which time I left Canada for England, that by the arrangement with the Hon. John Young, in behalf of the Terminus Company, the early construction of works, and their instant commencement was secured; and the Company in that expectation immediately carried out the Lines of railway upon their own land. But it appears that unexpected difficulties arose as to the mode of passing Mill Street, and Mr. Young was unable to procure the full amount of capital required within the time stipulated. That time was, however, extended; and without troubling you with all the details, I may state that I am waiting for letters from England which will have an important bearing on this subject, which the Company consider, in common with the City Council, to be so pressing, and which you may be assured will not fail for want any exertion on their part.

Montreal is the centre of the Grand Trunk system; and if proposed arrangements with other companies for united working are completed, the question of central terminal accommodation for a larger interest, will become more and more an essential work, to the extension of which, as the traffic progresses, capital raised on the joint security of the United Companies, and which the separate security of the Grand Trunk Company will not unfortunately at this moment command.

I need not say, after the opinions I had the honor to express last year in my official letter to your predecessor, laid before the Council, that there is not an atom of truth in the statement which has gone abroad, viz., "that the Company's offices are to be removed to the West." They will remain at Montreal; and the bill which the Company are about to introduce to Parliament, for power to re-arrange their affairs, contained, when it left England, two months ago, contains now, and will, if Parliament enacts the measure, by law finally provide—that Montreal shall be the seat of the Company's head offices in Canada. This fact must have been perfectly well known to those who have set forth this and other false and unjustifiable reports.

#### DISPOSAL OF PROPERTY IN CAMPEAU STREET.

The Road Committee reported:—That for the purpose of opening out Dorchester that from St. Denis street to Amherst street, it was deemed advisable by the Council to acquire, together with other land, the whole of Mr. Walter Prendergast's property on Campeau street, and there was still a residue of land, 50 feet by 84, available for public purposes. That as the Special Committee on the House of Industry have decided on selling by public auction, the whole of the property vested in them in Campeau street, the Committee considered this a good opportunity to dispose of the above mentioned lot to advantage, and therefore recommended that they be authorized to act in union with the House of Industry Committee for the sale of the land in question. Carried without discussion.

#### BY-LAW RELATING TO COMMON SEWERS.

The Road Committee reported:—That they had had under consideration for some time past the By-law passed on the 22nd May 1841, relating to common sewers. By the 2nd section of the By-law, it is provided that whenever its hall be determined by the Council to lay down a common sewer in any street, &c., within the city, one half of the expense shall be borne by the owners of property situate in such streets, and one half by the Council. The Committee were of opinion that the existing system of assessment was not just nor equitable, and that it should be ordered to be altered. The Committee therefore recommended "that the section be amended so as to provide "that the whole of the cost and expense of "every common sewer which hereafter be constructed shall be borne by the owners of pro-

#### SEWER IN ST. LAWRENCE STREET.

The Road Committee reported,—That the construction of the sewer in Upper St. Urbain street had been the means of diverting a number of small streams which intersect that section of the city, into the old wooden box drain laid in the slope of the Côteau Baron Hill in St. Lawrence street, and which in consequence of its contracted size and otherwise defective state, gave way, causing much damage to the more substantial brick sewer below. The Committee, in order to prevent further damage to the property in the vicinity, instructed the City Surveyor to clean the broken drain and remove the obstructions which impeded the course of the water. The Committee further reported that the wooden drain above alluded to is in such a decayed and dilapidated state as to preclude the possibility of repair, and they therefore recommended that they be authorised to construct a new sewer to replace the present wooden structure, and that the sum of \$600, the estimated cost, be appropriated to them for that purpose, it being understood that the proprietors on either side of the street, shall be assessed for their share of the cost thereof, according to law.
