Sect. 3. A line of Railway from Montreal to Three Rivers on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River and located at least twenty miles inland from the Banks of the St. Lawrence until it approaches the town of Three Rivers when it shall strike directly for Three Rivers.

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The said Railway shall be commenced at the Harbour of Montreal near and within the eastern limits of the city, within which also the station, work shops and terminus of the said Railway shall be located near the Harbour of the said city, and the said Railway shall be proceeded with continuously and without intermission until it reaches Three Rivers -

Sec. 4. The Mayor of the City of Montreal is hereby authorized or required for, and on behalf of the Corporation of this City to pay a Bonus of \$500,000 to the Railway from Montreal to Hull, or St. Jerome, commonly called the Northern Colonization Railway.

To the line of Railway running from, or near L'Anse aux Meules, as aforesaid to Ottawa, the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

To a line of Railway to Three Rivers built in accordance with the terms of section 3. \$250,000.

All subject to the terms and conditions, as to manner of building and payment, as in this Bylaw provided and no money shall be paid for the purposes of this Bylaw until all its terms and conditions are observed -

Sect. 5. The Bonus to each Railway shall be paid as follows: The length of each road shall be established by actual survey. The Chief Engineer of each Railway shall file with the City Clerk a certificate of its length.

The amount fixed as a Bonus by this Bylaw shall be equally divided according to the mileage of each road - and the completion in running order of each mile of the said Roads, provided however that not less than ten miles shall be paid for at any time.

Sec. 10. All the Railways in this By-law mentioned, shall be completed within three years from the first day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy two, otherwise no grant to be made.

Sec. 11. The Debentures to be issued by the said Corporation shall be for an amount not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twenty five years, and bearing interest at six per centum per annum, said interest payable semi-annually.



That, as directed by
the Council, the City Assessors have under the direc-
tions of Your Committee made a new Census of
the City, taking as a basis the actual and bona
fide resident population of Montreal

That Your Committee have every reason to
believe the Assessors and the several enumerators who
were employed in taking the new Census have per-
formed the duties entrusted to them with the utmost
care, diligence and accuracy; and as the result
of their labour, Your Committee now submit the
accompanying Schedule, showing an increase of
Ten thousand six hundred and forty over the po-
pulation given in the last official return made under
the auspices of the Government.

This increase, although falling somewhat
short of the expectations that were entertained is not
however unwelcome and the impetus which the
several large public improvements and enterprises
now in store, are likely to produce, the citizens
may look to the future with confidence and antici-
pate a still more favorable result in the next
decade.

It is well to observe here that there is a
large transient population from the Parcier
or surrounding Municipalities who daily find their
way into the City, being for the most part engaged
to work in some of the numerous work shops or
factories

factories established in Montreal,

It is estimated that the number of these heads of families who manage to earn their livelihood amongst us is not less than two thousand and representing a population of say: twenty thousand souls.

These of course are not included in the Census, as they are not, properly speaking, residents in the city, to which alone the census has been restricted.

That the expenses incurred in making the census, as appears by the accompanying statement, amount to the sum of \$1765, being within \$230 of the appropriation granted for that purpose, and your Committee recommend that they be authorized to pay the said sum of \$1765, the same to be provided for and included in the appropriations to be made in the month of April next.

THE RAILWAY BY-LAW.

The next order of the day was for the third reading of the by-law in aid of the Northern Colonization Railway.

Ald. BERNARD referred to the offer which had been submitted on the part of Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie. In order that the whole matter might be perfectly understood it would be necessary to occupy some time in reading the communications addressed by the City Clerk, by order of the Finance Committee, to Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie and to the Directors of the Railway, and the replies received. The correspondence was then read as below. As the answers respectively indicate the contents of the City Clerk's letters, it will suffice to give the former.

REPLY OF MESSRS. REEKIE AND OGILVIE.

Montreal, April 2nd, 1872.

CHARLES GLACKMEYER, Esq.,

Montreal.

SIR.—Since we addressed you on the 22nd ult., we have had the honor to receive the letter which, by order of the Finance Committee of the City Council, you addressed to us on the 25th.

The letter of the Secretary of the Northern Colonization Railroad Company dated 21st March, of which you have sent us a copy, we received about 6 p.m. on that day, and it must have been perfectly obvious that it was utterly impossible for us to comply with the request contained in that letter, viz., to send a reply to it before the meeting of the City Council which was called for half-past seven the same evening.

Since that date we have been furnished with a copy of the letter addressed to yourself on the 21st March, by the Secretary of the Northern Colonization Company and the terms in which our proposal to the Council is referred to, preclude it appears to us, the faintest hope of a satisfactory arrangement being made with the gentlemen at present polling the charter of the Northern Colonization Company and we have not consequently addressed ourselves to them, nor do we propose to do so.

Our proposal was to contract with the city, we had no intention of making a tender to the present organization of the Northern Colonization Company.

The city of Montreal in terms of the proposal now under discussion by the Council, whether it result in a grant of \$500,000 or \$1,000,000, must certainly be the largest shareholder in the Northern Colonization Co., and on that ground, we considered ourselves justified in addressing the Council direct representing as it does the Citizens whose money is proposed to be invested.

It can be of no consequence to the City Council who holds the Charter of the Northern Co., so long as the construction of a railway in substantial, speedy and satisfactory manner is secured to the Citizens for the sum whatever it may be, which they shall subscribe towards the enterprise.

We had cognizance of the proposed by-law, before we addressed the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors, and were consequently aware that no restrictions were by it imposed upon the N. C. Co., in the matter of the issue of bonds, or the mortgaging of the railway or land.

A primary condition of our offer, and we think this cannot but be apparent from its terms, is that we should be placed in the position of the N. C. Co., secured only to the same extent as it is secured in the possession of the lands granted by the Government of Quebec, but at liberty, as it is at liberty, to utilize these lands and make such financial arrangements for the prosecution of the work as we may find necessary.

We contemplated paying, and are quite willing to pay, any legitimate expenses which may have been incurred in making explorations and surveys by those who at present hold the charter of the Company, presuming that the sum does not exceed the amount mentioned in the letter of which you have sent us a copy, that is \$10,000.

As regards the aid to be given by other municipalities, we are willing to be bound by the terms of the By-law of which you have sent us a copy, viz.—

Fifty thousand shares of the stock shall be bona fide taken by other municipalities and by solvent persons competent to pay the amount of their subscriptions, which shall be to the satisfaction of the majority of the members of the said Corporation, who shall form part of the Board of Directors of the said Railway.

If the city would prefer to undertake to obtain a subscription from other municipalities, or private individuals, to the extent of \$500,000, that course would be equally agreeable to us.

With these preliminary observations we shall proceed to supply as fully as we possibly can, the information which the Finance Committee of the Council desire to receive, premising that by our letter of the 22nd ult. we have given an assurance that our intention is to build a railway from Montreal to Hull such as on this continent would be considered as a first-class road, fully equipped with rolling stock, the necessary stations, repair shops, &c., the whole work to be inspected and approved of as it progresses by an Engineer to be appointed by the city.

First Question.—The first point on which the Finance Committee desire information is with reference to the Branch line from Ste. Therese to St. Jerome. In our original offer we mentioned a grant of \$4,000 per mile, the distance being put down at 120 miles. This distance of course it is obvious did not include the branch from Ste. Therese to St. Jerome. To that branch the land grant of the Quebec Government does not apply, but it would be entitled to the aid proposed to be given to Colonization Railways by the 52nd Chapter of the Acts of the Quebec Legislature, 1869, or in other words a guarantee of 3 per cent. on \$5,000 per mile, with a guarantee on an additional amount for certain bridges.

If the Council attaches any importance to the construction of this branch, we will agree to construct it as substantially and in every respect as complete as the main line, if the city will give an amount in aid of it of \$4,000 per mile or \$5,400 for the 13½ miles to be constructed, a railway laid with lighter rails and less substantially built could, of course, be constructed for less, and if such a line would, in the opinion of the Committee, meet the necessities of the traffic, we shall be prepared to make a reduction in the grant now mentioned of say \$2,000 per mile.

2nd. Q.—To the second question put in your letter we reply that we did not contemplate the construction of a bridge at or near Hull. Our offer was for the construction of a railway to Hull only. We considered that a connection with the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway at Hull would be an object of such importance to the Canada Central Company and other lines that may reach the western side of the Ottawa River, that they would build a bridge across the river and form a junction. We are quite prepared, however, to undertake the construction of a bridge, and will furnish at once, for the information of the Committee, should they desire it, the terms on which we will undertake to build it.

3rd. Q.—In answer to the third question, we agree that the bridges over the principal rivers shall be constructed with substantial stone piers, and that no bridge with modern piers shall be built without the consent of the engineer appointed by the City Council as to form in which it is to be built.

4th Q.—To the fourth interrogation in your letter, we reply that we are prepared to put down iron rails of not less than 60 lbs to the yard, and of steel not less than 40 lbs. We would observe, however, in reference to this question that no mention is made of steel rails in the by-law of which you have sent us a copy.

5th Q.—The fifth question in your letter we have already, in effect, replied to. We propose to build a railway, which, measured by the standard of other railways on this continent, will rank as a first class road.

We propose to find all such ground as shall be necessary for freight sheds, sidings, piling grounds, &c., at Hochelaga, and also for a passenger station in the east end of the city; as regards the latter, it must be obvious that until the site of the proposed station is fixed, it is not possible for us to give an estimate of its probable cost. What we propose is to put up such buildings as shall, in the opinion of a competent person to be appointed by the city, be adequate for the purposes of the company and satisfactory to the Council.

6th, 7th and 8th Q.—This disposes of questions Nos. 6 and 7 in your letter, and in regard to question No. 8, we have already stated that we are prepared to pay any expenses legitimately incurred in engineering, surveys, explorations, &c., provided they do not exceed the amount already named, viz.: \$10,000.

9th Q.—The quantity of siding accommodation required referred to in question No. 9, we think would not exceed 5 per cent. of the entire length of the railway constructed, but we are quite prepared to build such length of sidings as will fully accommodate the traffic, and that without increasing the payment by the city.

10th Q.—For the right of way and land damages we expect to pay.

11th Q.—As regards Rolling Stock (question No. 11) we propose to supply what shall be deemed sufficient for the traffic. The Brockville and Ottawa Company Stock, according to the last official report consist of

7 Locomotive engines,
5 Passenger cars,
26 Box cars,
112 Platform cars.

The combined mileage of the Brockville and Ottawa and Canada Central Railways is 114 miles and the value of the foregoing stock is probably \$170,000. The local traffic upon the proposed railway cannot be large, and as soon as it becomes part of a through route so soon will the rolling stock of other and larger companies be available to run over it.

12th Q.—With reference to question No. 12 we do not propose to make any part of the railway with a less curve than 3,000 feet per radius, or of a heavier grade than fifty feet to the mile.

With regard to preliminary expenses, we know of no expenses which should have been incurred beyond those of obtaining the acts relating to the Company and of making explorations and surveys which we assume to be covered by the amount of \$10,000. Any sum not exceeding this amount we are quite prepared to pay as soon as the plans, documents and general information relating to the Company are handed over to us.

The ground necessary for the workshops in Montreal we propose to furnish, and think six acres will be ample for the purpose.

We have already informed the Council that we propose to complete the line by the 1st October 1872.

In conclusion, we hope we have answered in a satisfactory manner all the enquiries of the Committee, and we desire only to add that we shall be prepared to accept payment either in terms of the proposed By-law, or as each mile of the road is laid with iron.

REPLY OF SECRETARY OF THE COMPANY.

MONTREAL, 1st April, 1872

CHAS. GLACKMEYER, Esq.,

City Clerk, Montreal:

SIR.—I beg to acknowledge the reception of your letter of the 25th ultimo, requesting from the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway Company answers to different questions concerning this railway, put by the Finance Committee, and enumerated in your letter.

I am authorized by the Directors of the said Company to answer in the following manner: For the sake of clearness, the questions will be repeated and the answer given after each question.

1st. As a freight depot and certain superficial extent of ground for freight, sheds, sidings, piling grounds, etc., will be required at Hochelaga, what quantity of land does the Company propose to furnish there, and what are they prepared to expend on the depot?

Answer.—The area of land required at Hochelaga for freight sheds, piling ground, siding requirements, &c., &c., should not be less than twenty acres in extent, for the efficient accommodation of the trade of the Ottawa Valley, Quebec North Shore and eventually of that from the Pacific and Western extension of our road; of which quantity the Company would endeavour to obtain the whole, but will undertake to acquire at least ten acres for the exigencies of its trade.

2nd. Same question as applied to a Passenger Station, at a point to be selected in the east end of the city.

Answer. The Company will undertake to expend \$40,000 to assist in the erection of a Union Depot for passengers, for which at least three acres of land will be secured.

3rd. What length of sidings will the Company agree to build, as an appurtenance to the road?

Answer. Ten per cent. of the length of the main line.

4th. Of what value in money will be the Rolling Stock which the Company will place upon the road?

Answer. \$480,000 on the main line, and \$30,000 on the branch line to St. Jerome, making a total of \$510,000 in all.

5th. The Committee would like to have the views of the Company as to curves, grades and width of embankment?

Answer. The minimum curve on the main line and also on branch to St. Jerome, will be two degrees, or a radius of 2,865 feet. The maximum grade will be one foot rise in one hundred feet or 52 8-10 feet per mile. The width of embankment on top, or at a subgrade, will be fifteen feet.

6th. When will the Company commence the construction of the road, and by what date will they complete it?

Answer. The Company intends commencing the works immediately after the by-law comes into force, and to have the Road completed on or before the 1st October, 1872, according to the terms of the by-law.

7th. What extent of ground does the Company propose to furnish for the workshops of the city of Montreal, and what sum of money will they calculate for each shop?

Answer. The land for this purpose should not be less than five acres. An allowance of \$45,000 has been made for the erection of shops for ordinary work and repairs.

In conclusion I am directed by the Board to inform the Committee that on the 21st ult. I addressed, by direction of the Board, a letter to Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie, of which I enclose herewith a copy, to which, however, the Company has as yet received no answer, and the Directors desire me to express a hope that in considering the proposition of those gentlemen now before the Committee, their position with regard to rival roads will not be lost sight of. As it is understood that some question has been raised as to such connection I beg to enclose you, for the information of the Committee, a certified extract from the documents laid before the Government of Ontario by the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway, showing that Messrs. R. J. Reekie, C. J. Brydges, and D. A. McDonald subscribed for \$10,000 each in that road, which subscription Mr. McDonald certifies to the Ontario Government is a bona fide subscription. And I also enclose to you a number of the Montreal GAZETTE containing the prospectus of the Montreal and St. Jerome Railway Company, showing that Mr. Ogilvie is one of the Provisional Directors of that Company, and that in that prospectus he with his co-directors take a position entirely hostile to the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway, and moreover it is a fact that at this moment that Company is advertising for Engineers to lay out their line. I am also directed to state to the Committee that at a meeting of Directors held on the 30th inst., a draft of amendment to be suggested to the City Council to the By-law now under discussion was authorized binding the Company to carry fuel into the city at extremely low rates. And also, that the use of the Company's bridges and other facility in the Company's power was directed to be offered to the Council in the event of the suggestion of the Company's Chief Engineer, to bring water for the supply of the city from the neighbourhood of St. Jerome being adopted by the Council.

I am directed further to remark that there are expenses which the Company would be compelled to incur which are not referred to in the questions addressed to me by order of the Committee—such for instance as the expense of Right and Way and land damages, the cost of engineering and other incidental expenses of a similar character. These, as a matter of course, the Company will be obliged to pay.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The report of the Finance Committee was read as follows:

That, as directed by the Council, they have considered the letter hereunto annexed of Messrs Reekie & Ogilvie, offering to construct a railway from Montreal to Hull on certain conditions therein specified.

That before entering into the subject, however, your Committee, in order to avoid any misunderstanding recurring, deemed it expedient to obtain further information, not only from these gentlemen, but also from the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway Company, in regard to several points in connection with the proposed enterprise; also asking for explanations.

Your committee in consequence instructed the City Clerk to write to Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie and to the said company the accompanying letters, to which answers were received with documents as herewith submitted.

By referring to Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie's letter it will be seen that these gentlemen express in no equivocal terms their decision not to treat with the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway Company. They further state that it is with the city that they desire to contract, and they make it a primary condition that they shall be placed in the position of the Northern Colonization Railway secured in the possession of the lands granted by the Government of Quebec, and at liberty to utilize them, and they are willing to accept the same conditions; with regard to the municipal grants as those which are imposed upon the Northern Colonization Railway Company, that the city note shall be ineffectual unless five hundred thousand dollars of stock is subscribed by municipalities and others in addition to the city subscription. It appears to your committee that these conditions render impossible any action by the city upon Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie's position for the following reasons:

In the first place the land grant has been secured to the Northern Colonization Railway Company, by an act of the Parliament of Quebec, for a period of time which does not appear to be precisely settled by the Act, but which makes the land grant valid if the road be commenced before the 1st of May, 1873. Assuming as requisite for the completion of the road in three years from the 1st May, 1873, the land grant must at last be vested in the Northern Colonization Railway until the 1st May, 1876. There would therefore be no possibility of securing the land grant to Reekie and Ogilvie in

the way proposed in their letter, unless the Legislature of Quebec withdraw the grant from the Montreal Colonization Railway Company, and gave it to them, which could only be done after a failure by the Colonization Company to perform the conditions on which they hold the bonds; and it would then be a question whether these gentlemen could obtain from the Legislature the required act of incorporation and the desired land grant. If the offer of the Company continued in the letter of the 21st ult., to give the contract for the construction of the road to Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie if they would perform the conditions imposed on the Company which had been accepted, those gentlemen could apparently have attained the object of their proposition to the Corporation, but as they decline to transact with that Company, they have destroyed the possibility of any agreement in that quarter. Against the provision as to the municipal subscription contained in the by-law, is that the city subscription shall be inoperative until the amount of municipal subscriptions have been obtained. And the committee are not informed as to whether Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie have taken any steps to procure these subscriptions, or to ascertain whether they could procure them. If, therefore, these gentlemen should abstain from the necessary exertions to procure these subscriptions, or shall fail in securing them, the construction of the road would be indefinitely postponed.

Your committee, therefore, conclude as to this point that it is impossible for the Corporation to comply with the terms of Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie as to the land grant, and that the only mode by which these gentlemen could acquire the contract for constructing the road which they seek for, namely, by obtaining it from the company they have declined to make use of. Their proposition, therefore, can only be regarded as deserving of future consideration upon the theory that it is an expression of opinion by Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie as to the cost of the road, and the value of this opinion must depend before their qualifications to judge of it, and upon the impartiality with which they may be presumed to have regarded the question. Mr. Reekie is understood to be a railway contractor of considerable experience, and his opinion would be of considerable weight, if it were undoubtedly impartial and unprejudiced. The papers which have been furnished to the Corporation by the committee by the company with the previous transactions with respect to the by-law, afford some information on the subject which it is impossible to disregard.

By the extracts from the document in possession of the Government of Ontario, furnished by the railway company, undertaking to construct a road known as the "Coteau Road" to Ottawa, it appears that Mr. Ritchie is a subscriber of stock in that company with Mr. C. J. Brydges and Mr. D. McDonald, to the extent of \$107,000 each; and Mr. McDonald certifies these subscriptions to be bona fide. Mr. Ogilvie's name appears among the provisional directors of the Montreal and St. Jerome Railway Company, which company is now advertising for engineers to lay out their line. The first of these companies proposes to build a line to connect Montreal with Ottawa, passing for a portion of the distance over the Grand Trunk Railway; but its termini are the same as those of the Montreal Northern Colonization Railway Company, and it seeks the same trade which the other company proposes to acquire. The Montreal and St. Jerome Railway Company proposes to construct a railroad over the same line as the Northern Colonization Railway Company, and between the same points, as far as Montreal and St. Jerome are concerned, and its prospectus contains expressions showing a feeling hostile to the Northern Colonization Co. It appears also by the dates that this prospectus was issued immediately before the day fixed for the first reading of the present by-law; and that the offer of Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie was made on the evening of the day fixed for the second reading of the same by-law.

Your Committee therefore are forced to the conclusion that these gentlemen who are members of rival companies, one of them at least largely interested on a rival road, whose direct interest it is that the N. C. Railway should not be completed, are not entitled to have their opinion on a matter which appears to be vital to the latter company, received as being entirely impartial, or unprejudiced or as being entitled to as much weight as it would receive under different circumstances.

Your Committee do not propose to enter into the details of the answers which Messrs. Reekie and Ogilvie make to their questions as to the mode of construction and furnishing of the railway. It might suffice to say that in some respects they meet the requirements of the by-law, while as to the more important; such as station and station grounds, the workshops, the rolling stock, etc., they do not speak with that precision or clearness which the questions put to them and the importance of the subject appear to require and they make the bridge at Hull and the St. Jerome Branch extra charges, it may therefore be doubted whether if they should avail themselves of their replies on these points, they could not construct and furnish the road in so insufficient a manner as would require a larger sum to supplement deficiencies than that which their proposition would appear to save the city. But the fact that by their preliminary condition they place themselves in a position which renders it impossible for the city, ever to avail itself of their proposals as to details, renders it unnecessary further to discuss those details.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the said offer be not entertained, but that the Council do proceed without any further delay to the third reading of the by-law in aid of the said Montreal Northern Colonization Railway Company now before the Council.

In doing so, however, your Committee suggest suitable provision to be made in the by-law to compel the Company to bring firewood on fair and equitable terms and in reasonable quantities, and also in case it should be determined to draw the city water supply at or in the vicinity of St. Jerome that the Company shall give to the Corporation the free use of its bridges and the line of railway from Montreal to St. Jerome or such portion thereof as may be available for that purpose, and to afford the Corporation such facilities as lay in the power of the Company to obtain the object in view.

SYNOPSIS

of proposed amendments to the Acts of Incorporation of the City of Montreal, as adopted by the Council.

1. To provide a better mode of voting by electors in the City in cases of Railways grants: That is to say; the Council shall fix and establish as many polling places in each ward as may be deemed necessary according to the number of qualified Electors therein, and shall appoint the requisite number of returning officers; the number of polling days shall be limited to two and the polls shall remain open from 9 o'clock A. M. until five o'clock P. M. each day. All Municipal Electors in the City qualified according to the last assessment roll, shall be entitled to vote at such election, by saying "yea" or "nay"—the word "yea" meaning that the Elector approves the proposed By-Law, and the word "nay" that he disapproves the same.

2. That in addition to the power already vested in the Council to aid Railways by loans or by taking stock, the Council be authorised to grant bonuses, if deemed advisable.

3. To authorise the Council to assist Railway Companies in the establishment of a Railway line through the City, to connect the eastern and western extremities of the harbour with a joint station to be located within the City limits, and to control the use of said Railway line through the City.

4. To amend the provisions of the law, so as to alter the area of the Park as decided upon and as shewn on the new plan of the said Park prepared by the City Surveyor; to acquire the right of way, roads and avenues leading thereto and to include within the City, certain strips or parcels of land considered indispensable to carry out the improvement, and also to authorise the Council to sell part of the ground acquired for the said Park, provided the quantity of land so sold, shall not exceed two hundred and fifty acres.

5. To extend the City limits, as specified on a certain plan prepared by the City Surveyor.

6. To grant additional powers to the Council to regulate Steam Engines and Boilers and the erection of buildings in this City, with a view to their safety and the prevention of accidents by fire or otherwise.

7. To compel persons who intend to establish and use in the City, any wood yard for the storage of lumber, timber, firewood or laths, or to erect and use any saw and planing mill, carpenter or joiner's shop, or other shop or establishment wherein wood or other like combustible materials are kept and used, to obtain the previous sanction of the City Council, with power to the said Council to fix the places in the City at which such wood yards, mills or shops may be located and used, and to make such rules and regulations in reference thereto, as may be deemed necessary, for the protection of life and property in the said City.

8. To authorise the Council to prevent the erection and establishment of soap and candle factories and other factories of a like offensive character within the City limits.

9. To amend the law on expropriation so as to preclude the right of opposition by parties interested in any improvement, when such improvement shall have been resolved upon by a vote of not less than two thirds of the members of the Council, and it shall be determined by such resolution that one third of the cost of the said improvement shall be contributed by the said Council; provided however that before passing such resolution not less than ten days' notice shall be given, in at least one French and one English newspaper published in the City, of the intention of the Council to pass such resolution.

10. To amend the ninth Section of the Act 31 Vict., cap. 37 so as to include, in the public notice therein provided for, the limits of the section of city which shall have been determined by the commissioners to be benefited by the improvement, leaving out the names of the proprietors interested.

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11. To amend the section of the Act 27 and 28 Vict., cap. 60, by striking out the following words: - and they are hereby enjoined to place solid and durable boundary-stones at each angle or corner of the new streets, public squares, and places by them laid out and established; which said boundary-stones shall be shewn upon the said plans or maps.

12. To amend the twentieth section of the said Act (27 and 28 Vict., cap. 60) so as to authorize the Corporation to extend the aqueduct, and to establish reservoirs beyond the limits of the city and to acquire land for that purpose, in the same manner and under the same formalities as those prescribed in and by the said Act, for similar improvements, within the limits of the said city.

13. To authorise a Loan of \$50,000 in aid of the Chicago fire relief fund.

14. To authorise a further Loan of \$250,000 for the purpose of obtaining a larger and permanent supply of water for this City, procuring additional storage for water and extending the water pipe distribution in the said City (*vide* sec. 24 of 32 Vic. cap. 70.)

15. To give to the Corporation the right of *saisie-arrêt* in the hands of third parties and to authorize the City Treasurer to answer, on behalf of the Council, to *saisies-arrêts* served upon the Corporation.

16. To repeal the 25 Section of the Act 7 Vic. cap. 44, which requires the City Treasurer to keep separate books and accounts for the water works &c.

17. That real property be assessed and held liable for the assessment and subject to being sold for non payment of said assessment, under the formalities prescribed by law, without reference to the owner or occupier thereof, the number given to such property in the official book of reference of this City being taken as a guide, provision being made for securing to the owner of the property, the right of redemption for two years.

18. To authorize the Council to pass by-laws for raising on the credit of the City, by the issue of bonds or stock, any sum of money not exceeding in any one year, fifty thousand dollars, for any public improvement or requirement other than the ordinary improvements or requirements already authorized and provided for in the Acts of Incorporation of this City and over and above the ordinary yearly expenditure of the Corporation: provided such by-laws shall, before the final passing thereof, receive the sanction of the municipal electors of the city, in the manner hereinbefore prescribed in cases of railway grants.
