Translation of Monf. La Motte's Letter, to the Covernor of the Three Rivers.

Most Respected Dear Sir,

THEN I consider the greatness, the riches, and the extent of the French

monarchy, I am' very nuch perplex'd at not being able to fearch into the reason why we are not at this juncture better allitted with troops from France; and with every thing necessary, for the preservation of this fine and fertile country. Let the distance be ever fo great between us and France, the ought not to abandon us to the fury of our enemies; who will certainly drive us from our fruitful fields, from our beautiful verdant meadows, and rich pastures, from these enchanting rural haunts, and will make us quit thefe de lightful forests, and shady groves, those belov'd and venerable places! where we have fpent till this time, a quiet and agreeable life refembling those simple times of the first race of men, in the happy golden age of the poets. But I am losing myself, I wander, I dream, at the very instant of time, I should inform you of my great surprize! When I reflect on the affairs of Europe, and fee that they have taken up the attention of the French, and have turn'd them from the more effential regards of their true interest, to make them run after mere fantoms-Dear Sir, 'tis with regret I fee our approaching ruin, an irreparable loss to France, which will humble her, and curtail her greatness, with the power of the Gallie Empire; for the English will certainly, as foon as they become intire mafters of Canada, keep it for their own fecurity as well as interest. For if this war has not open'd their eyes, and shown them, that our intentions was to drive them into the fea, or force them out of America, where we cannot live together, they must be absolutely blind indeed ! You know 'tis the interest of France to have no neighbourhood with the English, their oldest and most inveterate enemies: It is likewise incompatible with the views of the ministry, and contrary to the grand system of politics, laid down by Richlieu; who trac'd out fo exquilitely fine, those lines of sublime policy, which leads infentibly, by unknown hidden ways, to univerfal monarchy-This great, vast, and impenetrable genius, had immense views for aggrandizing the French, and for the total extirpation of the Northern Hereticks -His wisdom was proof against the greatest difficulsies it was capable of, and comprehended every thing almost intuitively; and faw into futurity, with almost unlimitted powers - He was fore that there was nothing to fear, but from the English; for which reason, he gave all possible fuccour to Canada, as the part designed to undermine the whole of the British government; and by consequence, at once destroy, with that great bulwark of the protestants the whole body of hereticks, as well the Church of England, as the Lutherans and Calvinits, from off the face of the earth. Ardent in these pious sentiments, he order'd Canada and Acadia to be well peopled, and that peace should be made with the natives, whilft he fent Miffionaries to instruct them in the catholic religion: You are no stranger to what we have preach'd, to get rid of the English from America, to these rascally Savages, these Barbarians of human Nature, constitutionally cruel, and wicked by Disposition; always sierce, proud and untameable; as unificady as the Waves of the Sea, most execrable

a good Progress in the Beginning of the War, and had dispeopled a great Part of the Southern Governments; Those effeminate People made no Resistance, but fuffer'd themfelves to be butcher'd like Sheep .-Methinks, Sir, we committed a great Error in Politics, for not having in the Begining led all our Forces against New England, imme tately after Braddock's Defeat In the Consternation they were then in, I am perfusded that the Bravery of our Troops, affilted by the whole Force of Ganada, and the Savages, would have driven them into the Sea, and have given us the full Possession of all America; by which Means, we should have secured Canada to ourselves forever, and have rais'd the Greatness of France over all the Nations of the Earth. Seeing that the English, being depriv'd of the greatest Part of their Commerce, which they enjoy'd from their Colonies, would want Seamen to man their Men of War, and every Thing necessary for Naval Equipments; whillt the interior state of the Kingdom, finding infeif leffen'd in its Finances, for want of Trade, the would forn perceive those Fountains of her Riches dried up, when there would be no longer a Demand for her Manufactures, to the Western World; which would foon reduce her to a larguithing State, the Nation would become Bankrupts, their mighty Fleers and formidable Sea Armaments would no longer be the Terror of Enrope; but on the contrary, these proud Tyrants of the Sea, would be as little to be dreaded, as the Danes. But this agreable Prospect is vanish'd, a Reverse of Fortune has deflroy'd our most fanguinary Hopes. Alass in the miserable Condition we are in at present. I can see nothing but Difgrace, and Different to France: for the English are almost in Possession of this country; the next Campaign will give them the whole of i ; and we cannot imagine, that they will ever be to infatuated, as to reflore it again to the French, their declar'd Enemies; when their own Interest and safety forbids it : Whatever the European Powers may fay, at the General Congress for Peace, I expect no Restitution from that Quarter. For where is there a Power sufficient by Sea, to force them to Terms, contrary to their own Interest & security, against their Will ?* I am so much chaggin d Sir. with these Thoughts, that my Heart would burit with Grief, if I did not give you my Sentiments, upon the melanchuly Posture of our Affairs - Live, Farewell -I am mft respectfully Your's,



LONDON, August 26. From the Haerlam Gazette of Saturday laft. Hamburgh, Aug. 19. Baron van Hecht, his Profian Majesty's Privy Councellor residing here as Minister to the Circle of Lower Saxony, this Day, about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, received the important News, That the King his Master on the 15th of this Month had obtained a compleat Victory over the Army of General Laudohn, between Lignitz and Parchwitz; that about seven thousand of the Austrians were left on the Field of Battle, and above 4000 made Prisoners; among which are feveralOfficers of Distinction. Among other Fruits of this Victory 90 Pieces of Cannon are taken, which had been made Use of at the Siege of Breslau. When the Express set off, the Prussians were pursuing the Enemy. Marshal Daun was not far off with the main Army, but had not been able to fuccour General Laudohn.

LONDON, August 30. Extract of a letter from Mag debourg, Aug. 17.
