Peter Brehaut publicly acknowledge to
have wickedly and falsely reported that
was assaulted and robbed of my Fur Cap & mit-
-ten by three Soldiers of the 24 Regiment
on Thursday evening the 21 Instant on the
Hill opposite Franks Tavern. The Blous
and Bars which unfortunately for myself I
received, were given to me at a House at Sticks
where I went with a Young Man an acquaintance
of mine and in order to screen myself
from the displeasure of my Employer I
framed a scandalous and villainous Story
for which I am convinced and most humbly
beg pardon of His Excellency and the 24
Regiment for presuming to accuse the
Soldiers of it, of being guilty of such an
offence

This being the only apology I can
make to His Excellency and the Regt
for propagating falsehoods of the Men
belonging to it, trusts to their generosity
to pardon me, promising faithfully
never again to be guilty of such an offence

Dear George.

I take this opportunity of writing to you and to tell you that I am well and I hope that you are so likewise for as we have had no news from you, only that you were arrived safe in England I was anxious to know how you was pleased with the new situation I am pretty well now at school being in practice and your brother Henry in Redirection we had had nice fun for these two or three weeks your Papa, Mamma and Henry came to our house on Wednesdays and we go to your house on Saturdays and then Henry and I play at Speculation; I must know that about a month ago we went out to the country to Mr. P.'s house at St. Traps and some of the boys took my pony's my pony is quite well and your horse is pretty good state you must excuse me for writing you so short a letter it being already 9 o'clock I have finished this letter in hopes of an answer in a short time I hear that your Brother Henry is to write to you by the same vessel.
