Il est à regretter que le Comité de réception ait à combler un déficit de \$4,500.

I am requested by the Committee
named to erect a building for a Ball and
Socié to be given in honor of H.R.H. The
Prince of Wales, to inform you that they are
now erecting a large structure intended to
accommodate from eight to ten thousand
persons, on a lot belonging to Hugh Taylor
Esq. bounded in front by Sherbrooke Street
in rear by St. Catharine Street - on one
side by the rear of properties fronting on
Drummond Street, and on the other by a
projected street now in process of being
graded by the Montreal Corporation.

I am desirous to request, that the
Corporation would be kind enough to cause
the last mentioned street to be completed

as soon as practicable, in such a manner
as to afford His Royal Highness and the
public, convenient access to and from the
building in question during the approaching
festivities.

As very little remains to be done,
to make the road alluded to available, it
would confer a great favor on this Com-
mittee, if you could order it to be
completed at once, and thus enable
them to proceed with the erection of their
building, with all despatch.

RECEPTION OF THE PRINCE OF WALES

The Special Committee on the celebration reported that since the publication of their report on the proceedings to be adopted by the Council, on the occasion of the Prince's visit, they had two interviews with the deputation from the Citizens' Executive Committee, at which the respective duties to be assumed by each were discussed, when the following programme was adopted by both parties:-

Part of the festivities to be undertaken by the City Council, and for the carrying out of which the appropriation of \$10.000 has been voted:-

1. The chartering of a steamer for the accommodation of the Mayor, City Councillors and their guests, to meet the Prince and his suite on their approach to this City, leaving the Committee of Citizens the hiring of such other steamers as may be deemed necessary to form a suitable escort, and all other arrangements as may be suitable therewith.

2. The erection of floral and triumphal arches at the place of landing, and along the route therefrom to the intended residence of the Prince, the same to be ornamented with appropriate emblems, mottoes, and devices, and adapted for being lighted with gas.

3. Public Buildings to be illuminated on the evening of the Prince's arrival, and a proclamation to be issued by His Worship the Mayor, requesting a general illumination on the same evening. The triumphal arches to be lighted every evening during the Prince's stay in the city.

A torch light procession of the Fire Brigade to be

also organized.

4. A display of fireworks of a style grandeur commensurate with the occasion.

Part of the festivities to be assumed by the Committee of Citizens:-

1. The construction of a large building, adapted for a Ball and a Soiree, and capable of accomodating from 5000 to 8000 persons with ease, safety and comfort.

2. A display of Indian and athletic games, in fitting costumes.

3. A grand procession, representing the various trades of the City.

4. The steamboat excursion already referred to in connection with the steamers to be chartered by the City Council.

It was further recommended that a joint deputation from both Committees should be appointed to call on the Grand Trunk Railway Company, for the purpose of recommanding that the Victoria Bridge be lighted with gas, and ornamented with appropriate emblems and devices in honor of the occasion, during each night of the Prince's sejourn in this City.

In order to give full effect, eclat and uniformity to the proceedings, it was agreed that all the complimentary tickets to be issued by the Committee of Citizens be in the name of "the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of Montreal" without understanding, however, that they shall have the exclusive control and management of the whole arrangements connected with those portions of the programme to be undertaken by them, it being understood that before any complimentary tickets are issued by the Committee of Citizens, the names of the parties to whom they are to be addressed shall be submitted by the Executive Committee of the Citizens to the Special Committee of the Council for their approval.

EXTRAIT des procès-verbaux du Conseil de la Cité de Montréal, (Article de journal collé page 146)

The following is the report of the Special Committee:

That, as appears by the accompanying statement, the total amount expended by your Committee is \$10, 669. 86, showing an excess over and above the appropriation granted to them of \$665.86, for which your Committee recommand that a further appropriation be made to them. This extra expenditure your Committee trust will not appear extraordinary, when it is considered that it embraces the charges for police , Detectives from the States, and the gaz consumed on the arches, which it was never contemplated should come out of their appropriation.

Inclosing their labors, your Committee have much pleasure congratulating the Council and the citizens, generally, upon the cordial and enthusiastic reception His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has met from all classes and denomination during his short stay in this city.

If in this charge of the various duties devolving upon them, and if in making the numerous and complicated arrangements consequent upon the reception of His Royal Highness and his distinguished followers, anything should have occurred to give offence or cause for dissatisfaction, your Committee desire to embrace this opportunity of expressing their regret that it should so happen, particularly as it has been their anxious desire to avoid anything offensive and disrespectful, and to secure unanimity on such an important and auspicious occasion.

The children of the various Sunday and day Schools of the city will be placed on the Haymarket Square and in front of the Court House, and sing the National Anthem as the Prince passes.
The First Division will be in waiting on the Bonsecour Pier and adjoining Wharfs at 2 o'clock.
The Second Division will organize on the Champ de Mars at one o'clock.
The Third Division will organize in the West end of Craig Street at one o'clock.
The Fourth Division will organize on St. Catherine Street, extending along St. Denis Street to Viger Square at one o'clock.
Each Division when formed will proceed with their respective Grand Marshals, to the place assigned to them in the Procession a two o'clock precisely.
When the organization is complete, and joined by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Divisions will line the streets they then occupy, allowing His Royal Highness and the 1st Division to pass through to his residence, and then fall in, and follow in regular order.

Each Society and organization will be expected to provide itself with a Marshal well mounted, who will communicate directly with the Grand Marshals of their respective divisions. Each Society will also appoint a sufficient number of foot Marshals to assist the mounted Marshal in the execution of his duty.

Each Society may meet at its own rendezvous for the purpose of organization, from which place it will be expected to depart in good time to take the position assigned to it in the division.

All good citizens are invited to take part in the Procession, to fall in regularly with some of the Organizations, and assist in lining the streets in an orderly manner, open ranks, and thus facilitate operations, as well as secure to themselves a good view without crushing.
Carriages will not be allowed on the streets occupied by the procession.







It was further agreed that a joint deputation from both committees should be appointed to call on the Grand Trunk Railway Co., for the purpose of recommending that the Victoria Bridge be lighted with gas, and ornamented with appropriate emblems and devices in honor of the occasion, during each night of the Prince's sojourn in this city.

In order to give full effect, exact and uniformity to the proceedings, it was also agreed that all the complimentary tickets to be issued by the committee of citizens, be in the name of "The Mayor Aldermen and Citizens of Montreal" with the understanding however that that committee shall have the exclusive control & management of the whole of the arrangements connected with those portions of the programme to be undertaken by them, it being also understood that before any complimentary tickets are issued by the committee of citizens, the names of the (parties)

parties to whom they are to be addressed shall be submitted by the executive committee of the citizens to the special committee of the city council for their approval.



